I write this letter with optimism for what I have witnessed since my last correspondence. I recognize that we are living through the two pandemics of racism and COVID-19, yet I am encouraged by the unwavering resilience of Omega men.

COVID-19 remains prevalent in our country and its effects have been devastating. Our implemented plan of attack has provided us with tools to help us cope, maneuver, and remain safe. First and foremost, we continue to look to the Supreme Basileus of the Universe to guide us through these unprecedented times. Psalms 91 reminds us "thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night nor for the arrow that flieth by day, nor for the pestilence that walketh in darkness, nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday." The bible says, "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God, in Him will I trust."

We continue to uplift one another through the Brother You're On My Mind challenge which is to call four brothers every Wednesday. These Wednesday check-ins have been invaluable to brothers and their families. I too have enjoyed many conversations, sharing stories and laughs with Brothers from all over the world. This past November we witnessed the election of former Vice President, Joseph R. Biden, as the 46th President of the United States. GB41 LEADS COUNCIL OF PRESIDENTS

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) was founded on May 10, 1930 at Howard University in Washington, DC. There were 5 chartering organizations; Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

In 1931, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., and Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc., joined the council, followed by Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc. in 1937. The NPHC incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois in 1937, and Iota Phi Theta Fraternity, Inc. joined the NPHC as its ninth member in 1997. The supreme governing authority of the NPHC is entrusted to the Council of Presidents.

The Council of Presidents is composed of the elected president of each member fraternity/sorority. Our very own Grand Basileus, Dr. David Marion is the newly elected Chairman of the Council of Presidents.

After a discussion with Bro. Editor Norman "Bougie" Senior, Bro. Kelly Martin, and 7th District Public Relations Director Bro. Sean Bland, it was suggested that I (Bro. Kelly Martin) interview Brother Grand in regard to his new role with the Council of Presidents. I sat down with 41st Grand Basileus David Marion on November 24, 2020 for a conversation to discuss this occasion as well as the purpose and goals of the Council of Presidents over the next year in regard to the Black community.



KM: Tell me what the Council of Presidents is, and what is the function of the organization?

GB: The Council of Presidents is the Executive Board of the National Pan-Hellenic Council, so in every city, chapters of the Divine Nine are encouraged to join together as the National Pan-Hellenic Council and do initiatives together that could be even more impactful collaboratively versus doing them as an individual organization. Those councils are a part of the National Organization, National Pan-Hellenic Council and the National Pan-Hellenic Council has a president Vanetta Cheeks Reeder, who is a member of Sigma Gamma Rho. The President (Vanetta Cheeks-Reader) takes direction and is supervised by the Council of Presidents and typically it's by the Chairman.

KM: Ok, now correct me if I'm wrong, but you served on the Council previously in another capacity, correct?

GB: Yes. I was the Vice-Chairman of the Council of Presidents from September of 2019 to September 2020, and in September 2020, I was elected unanimously to be the Chairman of the council also referred to as the President of the Council of Presidents.

KM: What are the overall goals for the Council of Presidents over the next year?

GB: Well, we all do initiatives individually. For example, the Sigmas and the Kappas have a mentoring initiative and of course Omega Psi Phi has the Fatherhood and Mentoring initiative, so as organizations, we do all of those kinds of things separately.

All of us do St. Jude together, all of us have chapters to raise money for St. Jude and then St. Jude honors us, generally at the Congressional Black Caucus at a St. Jude event for the works and the contributions of the Divine Nine. The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated participates in fundraisers for St. Jude through our "Game Day Give Back" program. The Game Day Give Back program is a program that was near and dear to the heart of Bro. E. D. Hall out of the 6th District who has passed on, and also near and dear to the heart of Brother Conrado Morgan and several other Brothers who basically push the program; over this past year we gave more to St. Jude than we ever have in our history.

A lot of the organizations do the March of Dimes together, all of us network with Red Cross. However, the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated now networks not only with Red Cross, but with the National Weather Service, Homeland Security and VOAD (National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) that allowed me to make the decision that we needed our own emergency response/emergency preparedness team. This way we are able to assist in keeping Brothers informed about hurricanes, tornadoes and other natural disasters that may be a threat in their immediate areas. Also, this network is used to get help to the folks in our communities and connect with resources that are not always known to the masses when a disaster occurs. Lastly, this allows Brothers and Chapters to do effective service work after a natural disaster hits and to help our communities recover. As a whole, all of us (organizations) are in partnership with the NAACP, and all of us decided to work as a collective on the "Get Out The Vote" initiative.

Each individual organization has their own get out the vote program. Omega, for example has about two hundred thousand initiated Brothers, but together the Divine Nine has 2.5 million members. Collectively, we have a reach that is around 5 to 7 million and so again collectively we can do things together in a more impactful way than we could individually. Collectively, we coordinated our strategy with the NAACP to get out the vote. We got with Sybil Wilkes of the Tom Joyner Morning Show, she served as moderator for a series of panel discussions with the Council, the four Sororities got together and did some things on Oprah's show and other events to get out the vote. The Fraternities took on an initiative together to get a million more Black men out to vote for this election, so all our organizations collectively were successful in getting more Black People out to vote in this election than ever before in history.

The Council of Presidents, continued

- KM: Indeed, that's an absolutely beautiful thing. It's all about collaboration, and that collaborative spirit is what it takes to really affect change and have a tremendous impact on those we serve. Is there anything else about the (Panhellenic) Council/organization that you think people should know, that they may not know?
- GB: I think people don't appreciate how much we work together; each of the President's gets correspondence for their respective members saying they did not know we work together to that degree. A lot of chapters don't join councils locally. If you are a part of the National Pan-Hellenic Council locally, they understand that we're trying to do some things in concert to give back to our communities. We try to give back also on college campuses, doing the same thing working together to impact our college campuses in a big way.

So I think that's what's been surprising to most. When they saw all nine of us on the Sybil Wilkes show; when they saw all nine of us at the "Bloody Sunday" commemorative march in Selma; when they see all nine of us at the Congressional Black Caucus weekend in September every year, then they begin to see collaboration they didn't even know existed.

When they see the Omegas and the Deltas on the national level put on a mental health initiative, they begin to see things they've never seen before. So I think people will be amazed how well we get along and how impactful and effective we are, because we get along!

- KM: I see, and it's a beautiful thing. Again, that collaborative spirit, there is always more strength in numbers when everyone has a common vision and goal.
- GB: I think there was no clearer display, when you see the Alpha Phi Alpha President, Everette Ward; Reuben Shelton, Grand Polemarch (Kappa Alpha Psi); Andre R. Manson, Grand Polaris (Iota Phi Theta); Micheal E. Cristal, International President of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity who also went to Mississippi State where I went to school; President/CEO of Delta Sigma Theta Beverly E. Smith; Dr. Glenda Glover, Supreme Basileus (Alpha Kappa Alpha); Valerie Hollingsworth-Baker, International President (Zeta Phi Beta); Rashida Liberty, International President/CEO of Sigma Gamma Rho when they voted unanimously that I be the Chairman of the Council of presidents then you know how unified you are.
- KM: Looking at the turnout for the recent Presidential election, what are the plans of the Council to keep voters energized and engaged for the mid-term election cycle.
- GB: Well, before we get to the mid-term elections, we have to get to the January 5th races in the State of Georgia.
- KM: Agreed, absolutely, continue please.
- GB: Two Senate seats are up for grabs in the state of Georgia, and that can determine a whole lot of things for the incoming Biden-Harris administration; it is important that we once again focus on getting out the vote. We've already begun doing that. We've already met with the NAACP. We've also already heard from the candidates in the race. Our job now is to collectively do what we did across the United States, but now focus all of our energy on the State of Georgia.

We have been able to identify the counties that mostly impact the outcome in the State of Georgia, we are focusing on the nine counties right around the city of Atlanta because most times in a runoff we don't come out in the same numbers. We're educating our brothers and sisters in Georgia about the importance of these races, what's at stake, the same way we did education about down-ballot races and issues.

- KM: As a proud product of an outstanding HBCU, The Jackson State University, does the Council have any special plans, programs or strategies on tap to assist with HBCU sustainability?
- All member organizations have something in place; all of us donate to and support HBCU's. As we know, six of the nine organizations that make up the Divine Nine were started on HBCU campuses. All of us have initiatives to help HBCU's, to give monies to HBCU's, I think the AKA's do a great job, they'll raise a million dollars in 24-hours slated to go to HBCU's.

Delta Sigma Theta does an outstanding job donating to HBCU's, you know right now our fraternity has the Omega thousand for a thousand initiative where we're trying to raise a million dollars for HBCU's. We understand the importance and significance of HBCU's, and we understand how hard they've been hit during this pandemic. We have also asked the Biden-Harris administration, within their first 100 days to look at a tech initiative. We know Black folks were left out of the Industrial Revolution. We don't want to see Black

folks get left out of the tech revolution. Right now, we already seen signs of that, where Black folks don't have the same access to Wi-Fi devices and so on as others. What we've asked them to do, is look at this initiative to help us reduce the racial wealth

disparity gap where in Boston. for example, the average net worth of a white family is \$245,000 dollars and the average net worth of a Black family is a small fraction of that. We believe one of the ways to do that is to create a high tech trained and talented workforce, and we want that tied into the HBCU's. We'd like to see bootcamps on HBCU's campuses that are funded by Congress and by those high-tech companies like Apple and Google and etcetera. Ultimately helping to create the kind of workforce that they say they want, they say and admit

they do not have a diverse workforce, and this will resolve that issue. If you can get monies to HBCU's to develop curriculum and get the training to produce the kind of tech-savvy folks that you want all on the campus of HBCU's.

KM: Awesome, that is a huge deal and can be a game changer; that's good information to know. Does the Council have any plans or initiatives to promote and support Minority/Black businesses or, to encourage economic impact in predominantly minority areas?

GB: Well, I think we all have economic development as a part of our mandated programming. Anytime we do national meetings, across the board, we make a concerted effort to do business with our people. We wouldn't want to come to a town and they not come out ahead, in the black, by our being there. Just like with us, on our International website where we put up black owned hotels where Brothers traveling across the United States, could stay with and spend money with these establishments.

Again, we're always giving money to initiatives to try to help black businesses; we promote them, we promote them on our websites, we promote their books and so there's a continuous effort to make certain that we be a hub of working with one another. We're working too with Rodney Sampson who is a Brother of Omega Psi Phi. He's a very tech savvy venture capitalist, he creates and helps tech firms; so, we are working with him to bring that same type of awareness to young people. We always want to partner with organizations that are focusing on helping black folks.

Omega right now is working on an initiative with the Secretary of the Army to make certain that our Brothers are aware of opportunities with the Army not only in terms of serving with the Army but securing the civilian jobs that many are not aware of.

The Council Of Presidents, continued

GB: ...I was on a call this morning with the Secret Service, they want to partner with the Omega Psi Phi and the Divine Nine just as the Army wants to do in order to get the word out about Secret Service possibilities. How to apply for the jobs and what kind to look out for early in life that you'd be eligible for employment with them. We partner with the National Park Service to get more Black interns into the Park Service. You know we partner with GE to get some of our folks into those GE positions and that partnership came about from talking with Omega Men employed at GE. So, we're constantly looking for ways to do business with our own, because we understand that's how you try to turn money over and over again. Omega Psi Phi has its own banking institution, so we encourage Brothers and others to use our Federal Credit Union to make deposits and banking so it's always a continuous effort on all of our parts to do business with each other and our people.

KM: Excellent, this brings me to my last question, what are some specific challenges faced by the Divine Nine organizations?

GB: I think it is always the challenge of people not really appreciating what all we do, ESPN has been very integral in helping to shift that image, I think people think of the fraternities and sororities as just a college experience. Therefore, they are surprised to see that membership in black fraternities and sororities extends long after ones college life; those who are aware of the existence of black fraternities and sororities, the NPHC in particular, think that all we do is hop or step and party. So when they get an opportunity to hear of the millions that collectively we give in scholarship and the service hours to our communities, they are amazed when they see our impact as a whole. I've tried as the Grand Basileus to raise our profile so people can say did you know Omega did this, Omega is doing that but they see us doing these wonderful things, it is kind of amazing to them that they just did not know we are out here doing these things.

Now what is really changing our brand and strengthening our brand is market; to ourselves because our own Brothers don't know the reach of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Incorporated. So, we have to do a better job of letting our Brothers know that we have our own financial institution, we have our own insurance company, we've applied to the UN for non-governmental organizational status. The fact is, as an international organization we are in more countries than any of the other Divine Nine organizations. That truly is a testament to the desire of Brothers to serve.

Anytime we get somewhere, and we find out there are other Omegas, the first inclination of the Brothers there is how feasible is it to start a Chapter and they start doing service projects and mandated programming in the countries where they live. In Shanghai, the Brothers work with kids who have been orphaned and diagnosed with cancer and parents can't afford the radiation treatment or chemo and so they give them up, our brothers are working with them. When you go to London, England you'll find our Brothers working at a domestic violence shelter, when you go to Dubai you'll see the same thing,



Brothers working in a domestic violence shelter, when you go to Tijuana, our Brothers there are helping people who got caught at the border and could never cross into the country and are hungry and homeless, those are the kind of initiatives that Omega does. So, we're unaware of it, we're unaware that we are in Ghana and we financed four wells for clean water there but now we've done up to 28 because Brothers are insistent that we help our people in Africa and provide water for them for years to come.

KM: Lastly, is there anything I have not asked about that you would like to address or add at this time?

GB: No, actually I think that we have a well-oiled machine right now, not only in Omega but also, with the Council of Presidents. Once we get past this election January 5th 2021, we will circle back to the table to look at what Social Action Project we want to come together on to be impactful. A lot of us have mental health initiatives that's near and dear to my heart, so look for that to be something that we do collectively to be more impactful. Numerous things are on the table to raise the profile of the Divine Nine and nothing more than being given credit for getting more Black people than there has ever been in history out to the polls and making an impact in this last election.

During these trying times with people protesting all over the world against systemic racism and police brutality, we still are facing one of our biggest opponents: COVID-19! Gratefully, Omega Charities has remained resolute and continues to serve the community. Bro. Editor Norm Senior converses with the President of the Omega Charities, 4th District Immediate Past District Representative, Bro. Bobby L. Robinson, to discuss all the great things of this Omega affiliate.



Bro. Senior: Sir, how does Omega Charities maintain with everything going on in the world today?

IPDR Robinson: In times of tragedy we feel a deep need to make sense of an often-chaotic world and to find order within it by acting upon it in some way. We realize that our communities are hurting, - Omega Charities is here to accept the challenge to improve those situations.

Bro. Senior: How or why did you become involved with this organization?

IPDR Robinson: I have always been involved in charitable organizations and committees. Brother Grand Basileus Marion observed a need for additional board members for Omega Charities, and requested that I consider the position. I love the difference and impact Omega Charities makes in the lives of Black people throughout the diaspora based on various contributions. Hence, I eagerly accepted the position as a board member. Then after serving on the board for about a year, I was elected President.

Bro. Senior: What are the different projects you have recently been involved?

IPDR Robinson: We, Omega Charities, have worked on three major projects of late:

- 1. COVID-19 Mask Distributions
- 2. Boreholes for Ghana (clean water program)
- 3. Fundraising

First, Omega Charites ordered 50,000 three-layer civil face masks to distribute throughout Omegadom. The distributions were based on the number of positive COVID-19 tests, as recorded on www.arcgis.com. Bro. Keith Wilson, of Kool-K Entertainment, was moved by Omega Charities donation of the 50,000 masks throughout the world, and made a beautiful song, "This Too Shall Pass." Please download the video from the link: http://koolkentertainment.com and click on OMEGA CHARITIES FUNDRAISER tab. A portion of the proceeds from every download will go to Omega Charities. Realize you are helping us better support our Brothers during times of crisis, and equipping us to have more resources to function as the philanthropic arm of Omega Psi Phi. Let me make one more plug, PLEASE purchase this outstanding video and support our fundraising efforts.

Secondly, we must continue to collect funds from Districts, States, Corridors, Chapters, lines, and/or individual brothers to commission more boreholes for the "Water is Life Initiative in Ghana, Africa." We completed 24 boreholes by November 2020 at \$4,000.00 per borehole (we are rapidly approaching this goal). Each borehole provides clean drinking water for over 62,000 Ghanaian People. After we receive the funds, we will have Bro. Jonathan Akuamoah contact you about the designing of your signage. Bro. Akuamoah will provide photographs and video of the dedication of the borehole when complete, and he will advise the village name to which you ministered. Also, you will receive a letter from Omega Charities, Inc. documenting your tax deductible gift.

Thirdly, for Omega Charities to continue to provide disaster relief, fatherhood and mentoring support, STEM programs, and the host of other humanitarian gifts, we need funds. IPDR Robinson: Thank you Bro. Senior for this awesome opportunity. I will summarize Omega Charities, Inc. We are the 501(c)(3) philanthropic arm of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Our mission is to:

- 1. provide programs to uplift the Black Community (especially young males);
- 2. Foster programs and activities of economic empowerment in distressed neighborhoods; and
- 3. Provide humanitarian assistance and disaster relief in times of critical need.

Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. ("OPP") has formed its own insurance company. Pan Global Ltd is a wholly-owned subsidiary of OPP, a licensed captive insurance company.

Owning a captive means that part of OPP's premium and interest thereon that covers part of OPP's insurance will remain within OPP's control and not with third-party insurers. At the same time, OPP's liability will be covered as if a third-party insurance company covered the liability.

The decision to create its own insurance company underwent years of analysis. Most recently, OPP hired Artex Risk Solutions, a subsidiary of Arthur J. Gallagher & Co., one of the world's largest Insurance brokerages, to extensively review OPP's risk and insurance coverages. The study validated OPP's analysis concluding coverage of OPP's liabilities is profitable for third-party carriers. It also concluded that OPP could cover its own risk and, at the same time, maintain the profitability of coverage.

Although many did not believe that OPP could meet the prerequisites to establish its own captive insurance company, OPP did meet the stringent requirements. After intense and detailed review by the District of Columbia insurance regulators, Pan Global LTD was issued its certificate of authority on October 22, 2020.

Initially, Pan Global is providing only OPP's excess insurance coverage. It provides excess liability coverage over OPP's two primary commercial insurance policies while mitigating loss expense and providing stability in loss cost financing. While covering OPP's excess liability, Pan Global gives OPP the flexibility in choosing retention levels, the ability to fund future losses, and lessen the impact of insurance market fluctuations, which has not been kind to OPP.

OMEGAS LEADING CHARGE FOR NFL, NFLPA'S SOCIAL JUSTICE INITIATIVES

Since San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick took a knee during the Star-Spangled Banner in his team's third preseason game of the 2016 season, social justice has taken a front row seat into the world of sports.

The silent protest to bring awareness to the deaths of unarmed Black people at the hands of police set the world on fire. Many called for the players to be censored, while others applauded their demonstrations. While some NFL players carried on with life as usual, others stepped up, delved deeper and became voices of the movement.

Bro. Malcolm Jenkins, a safety with the Philadelphia Eagles, was one that did just that. Beginning September 19, 2016 in a game against the Chicago Bears, Jenkins raised his fist in solidarity and would continue to do so throughout the 2016 and 2017 seasons. That silent protest sparked Jenkins, a Spring 2007 initiate of Iota Psi Chapter at The Ohio State University, to have a more intense focus on this issue and would be the first small step in a larger path.

Soon thereafter, Jenkins and two of his teammates took a ride along with members of the Philadelphia Police Department. Two months after that, Jenkins, along with four other NFL players, traveled to Capitol Hill and met with Rep. Keith Ellison (D-MN), Rep. Patrick Murphy (D-FL), members of the Congressional Black Caucus and members of House

Speaker Paul Ryan (R-WI)'s executive committee to discuss how to make policy changes.

His work would earn him the NFLPA's 2017 Byron "Whizzer" White Award, which is the highest honor given by the NFL players' union to a player "for his profound dedication to positively impacting his team, community and country". However, his work was just beginning.

In 2017, Jenkins and fellow NFL player Anquan Boldin created the Players Coalition, an organization of professional athletes across various sports that are dedicated to impacting social justice and racial equality.

INVESTING

Investing is a tool all Omega men should make a priority to protect and plan for the unforeseen and future.

Key Factors for Investing

- 1. Investing is an effective way to put your money to work and potentially build wealth. As an investor you should have a strategy which will allow your money to outpace inflation and increase in value. The greatest growth potential is primarily due to the power of compounding and risk-return tradeoff.
- 2. Investing is important to accomplish your financial goals and provide a buffer for unforeseen expenses. Investing is a long-term commitment and is the key to building wealth.
- 3. As an investor you get to share in wealth creation.
- 4. Investing is for people who want to generate more wealth, ready to take risk, ambitious, and enthusiastic about seeing your investment grow.

One of the most important factors in how much wealth you can accumulate depends on when you start investing and saving. Thinking you do not currently earn enough to invest and that you will start and catch-up later is a mistake. Your goal is financial security and wealth and postponing will reduce both over your lifetime.

A proven strategy is to use automation to remain a disciplined investor. Your employer may offer a 401K or 403B retirement account where your contribution will be an automatic payroll deduction. Also, take advantage if your employer matches some of your contributions. If you are self-employed, you can have an IRA, SEP-IRA, SIMPLE IRA, or a Solo 401k.

Establishing automatic deposits, allows you to put money aside before it's seen or you are tempted to spend it. This is a wall you establish to outsmart yourself, so you manage money wisely. An investment strategy and approach with automatic payments is a great way to relax and systematically grow richer.

Consider investing a minimum of 10% to 15% of your gross income for retirement. Then make sure you have at least three months of savings for unforeseen emergencies. These monthly saving amounts should be like a bill with a due date you receive from a merchant. If this seems like more than you can afford, start tracking your spending carefully and categorizing it. You will identify how you are spending money and ultimately provide yourself opportunities to save more.

Retirement accounts will allow you to accumulate wealth and reduce your tax bill. When you invest, you contribute on a pre-tax basis and defer paying tax on both contributions and earnings until you make withdrawals in the future. With a contribution to a Roth 401k or Roth IRA, you pay tax on contributions upfront, but receive withdrawals completely tax-free (if certain requirements are satisfied).

Take the time to interview and select an Investment Counselor or Planner. This maybe a company such as Fidelity who is in partnership with your employer or your bank or insurance company may offer these services. Always, schedule to meet your advisor at least once per year, ask questions and take time to fully understand your portfolio because this is your future.

Omegas Leading Charge for NFL, NFLPA's Social Justice Initiatives

Following a white nationalist rally in Charlottesville, VA in August 2017 that left a woman dead, Jenkins and three other players wrote a 10-page memo to NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell asking for the league's support in their push to promote racial equality and criminal justice reform.

Just days later, while at a rally in Alabama, President Donald Trump advocated for the NFL owners to release players that protest, classifying them as a "son of a b*tch" in the process.

"Wouldn't you love to see one of these NFL owners, when somebody disrespects our flag, to say, 'Get that son of a b*tch off the field right now. Out! He's fired. He's fired!,'" Trump said. "You know, some owner is going to do that. He's going to say, 'That guy that disrespects our flag, he's fired.' And that owner, they don't know it [but] they'll be the most popular person in this country."

The President's comments catapulted the protests to a larger stratosphere and fueled a more fervent passion by not only Jenkins and his fellow players, but the NFL and the NFL Players Association (NFLPA).

In December 2017, the NFL partnered with the Players Coalition to launch the NFL Social Justice Initiative, which is "a player-led platform to engage with team owners, public officials, law enforcement, academic institutions, community partners and others to identify meaningful ways to strengthen local communities and the greater society".

One of the many initiatives within this partnership is "My Cause, My Cleats," which spotlights stories of players who use their game cleats to showcase causes that they are passionate about. While started prior to the inception of the NFL Social Justice Initiative in December 2016, "My Cause, My Cleats" has been brought into the initiative and has flourished ever since. One such player who has been very involved with this initiative is Bro. Wesley Woodyard, a linebacker for the Tennessee Titans.

Woodyard, a Spring 2007 initiate of Rho Lambda Chapter at the University of Kentucky, announced that he would don a special pair of cleats that honor those suffering from ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease). For the upcoming game against the Denver Broncos on December 11, 2016, he began his tribute with cleats honoring former Titans linebacker and teammate Tim Shaw who was diagnosed with ALS in 2014. In doing so, he was also paying respect to his aunt, his grandfather and his wife's aunt, who each suffered and died from the disease.

Woodyard has also created The16Ways Foundation to provide programs to at-risk youth that are focused on academic, social, emotional, and professional development.

While Jenkins and Woodyard have been representing players on the field, Bro. Joe Briggs has been doing the same within the union. Bro. Briggs, a Spring 1999 initiate of Epsilon Alpha Chapter at Texas Christian University and senior counsel at the NFLPA, has been very involved as the co-chairman of the NFLPA Social Justice Task Force. Both Bro. Briggs and Bro. Carl Francis, a Summer 2013 initiate of Sigma Mu Mu and NFLPA Director of Communications, have played a role organizing as the union has continued to ramp up their work in this space. For the opening games of the 2020 season, the NFLPA distributed t-shirts to all 32 NFL teams that stated "INJUSTICE AGAINST ONE OF US IS INJUSTICE AGAINST ALL OF US" on the front and "END RACISM" on the back.

The NFL and NFLPA were also very involved with voter education, voter registration and providing support to poll workers for the 2020 election. The NFLPA also received toolkits for social media and engagement from three different organizations: When We All Vote, Black Men Vote and Black Girl Vote. This allowed the union to distribute messages on the ways that people can register to vote. The union also worked with the Lawyers Committee on Civil Rights and their subsidiary organization, 866 Our Vote on Election Protection, to distribute messages around the organization's hotline for voting questions. In addition, the NFL has committed to provide scholarship grants to and through victims of social justice.



With the social and cultural climate of the last several years, the NFLPA and players like Jenkins and Woodyard understand their platform and have stepped up knowing that their voices rang a little louder due to the prestige of being or working with professional athletes.

"As a Black man, as a father, as a man and as a Christian, God has placed me in the great position to have some kind of power and influence, but more importantly to be able to be a role model for our community," said Woodyard. "I think that so many times as athletes, we feel it is not our place to use our platform for what it is, and that is to bring positive change, to promote health within our community, and to be the light for darkness for people who can't."

"I used my platform to hold numerous press conferences to uplift the work of criminal justice and education advocacy groups to generate media attention," said Jenkins. "We've also worked extensively in our communities to improve police-community relations."

The Players Coalition has remained diligent in its work with social justice. "We've been focused on addressing the inequalities and racial disparities in our criminal justice system, our educational system and the disparate wealth in our marginalized communities," said Jenkins. "I've held district

attorney town halls with other players in Pittsburgh, Oakland and Sacramento and have lobbied for the passage of the PA Clean Slate Act with teammates to seal nonviolent criminal cases after a 10-year span of having a clean record," said Jenkins. "I've also attended bail hearings and successfully campaigned to reduce or eliminate cash bail."

The work of the Players Coalition is not just confined to criminal justice. They have even breached the world of education. "Several guys in Boston lobbied for an education bill that increased the budget by \$1 billion across state and local communities to help even the playing field for those communities who have less funds in their school districts, which largely are attended by our black and brown students," stated Jenkins.

Jenkins has been inspired by Muhammad Ali, John Carlos and Tommy Smith and credits several of his life experiences to his work in social justice, but Omega Psi Phi is one that stands out. "When I was in college at The Ohio State University, I didn't know at the time that my Omega Psi Phi experience was preparing me for the type of leadership that I've stepped into, whether that's social justice or my Foundation or as an entrepreneur," stated Jenkins. "It also taught me a true sense of community and brotherhood, with relationships that have lasted for close to 15 years."

Understanding the full umbrella of social justice reform, Jenkins has also added a media component to his work. "Black people are not monolithic, and we need to showcase this in creative, engaging, informative, and entertaining ways to the mainstream public with positive and realistic views of Black fathers, Black mothers, Black families and more," says Jenkins. "I've been heavily involved this year with my production company Listen Up Media with the goal to create change through scripted and unscripted storytelling. Black Boys, the first film I executive produced, is currently streaming on Peacock and I'm proud of that."

With the great work that the NFL and the NFLPA have done, much of it would not be done without the internal and external work of people like Jenkins, Woodyard, Briggs and Francis. The league and society have been better for it and will continue to be for years to come.

Over the summer of 2020, after the murder of George Floyd, 10 For10 organized 10 events including protests, rallies, concerts, a fashion show, and an art show in Denver, Colorado, all within a span of 6 weeks.

The events were purposed to give youth a platform to speak on issues centered around them. Moving forward, 10 For 10 has restructured and will continue to create experiences centered around its pillars, Mentorship, Community, Education, Advocacy, and Wellness. 10 For 10 is poised to grow into a nationally recognized service organization, with collegiate, K-12, and community chapters across the United States.



Hollins Battles Voter Suppression in Texas

The 2020 election was one of the most pivotal in American history. President Donald Trump's election and term in office caused an increase in white nationalism and complete shift in the country's perception globally.

While this election was always going to be important, things changed drastically in March 2020 with the government shutdown due to COVID-19. Due in large part by how the President handled the virus, the economy began plummeting, people were losing their jobs and hospitals were overcrowded. The May 25 murder of George Floyd, an unarmed Black man who died with former Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin kneeling on his neck, caused global protests and uprisings, which ignited even more of a fervor around this election.

Just six days before Floyd's death, a political move was made in Floyd's hometown of Houston that would have a large impact on the election.

Harris County Commissioners Court appointed Christopher Hollins, a fourth-generation Houston native, as the Harris County Clerk on May 19, just days after Diane Trautman resigned from the position. This position generally is responsible with tracking records in the county, such as birth and death certificates, marriage licenses, and property documents. However, Hollins knew that it had the ability and authority to do more.



"As a political strategist, I have long been aware of the importance of the position of County Clerk in Texas, specifically because of the impact the Clerk can have on election administration," stated Hollins, a Spring 2005 initiate of Psi Chapter at Morehouse College. "In 2018, a Democrat (Diane Trautman) had become Harris County Clerk for the first time in decades, but she resigned abruptly after health challenges she was facing was complicated by COVID-19."

"I thought I was the best person to serve in that capacity because of my background transforming government organizations as a management consultant (with McKinsey & Company)," continued Hollins. "I applied for the appointment and pledged not to run for the office permanently, but to instead focus 100% of my attention on doing the job. I was fortunate enough to be selected after a few rounds of interviews."

The timing of the appointment, amidst the national protests sparked by Floyd's death, also struck a chord with Hollins. "The murder of George Floyd hits home for me in a personal way," says Hollins. "My father's name is George.

He grew up in Third Ward and graduated from Jack Yates High School. George Floyd grew up in Third Ward and graduated from Yates. And just weeks after Floyd's murder, my only son was born — his name is also George. He is being reared at our home in Third Ward, where we're zoned to Jack Yates High School."

"It pains me to know that the hate my father endured during segregation, and the fate that befell Brother Floyd, could still be the state of affairs in the America that I pass down to my own son," continues Hollins. "But in the days since that terrible moment, the largest movement for justice in my lifetime has taken place – perhaps in the entire history of these United States. And at a time when so many were yearning to have their voices heard, I took office with the realization that it was my duty to ensure that they could have their say at the polls on Election Day."

Hollins, who also serves as Vice Chair of Finance for the Texas Democratic Party, entered this role with an already impeccable resume. He graduated summa cum laude from Morehouse College in 2007, where he was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, and received his J.D. from Yale University School of Law and his M.B.A. from Harvard University Business School in 2013. Prior to spending most of his professional life at McKinsey & Company, he was a summer associate at the prestigious law firm Wachtell, Lipton, Rosen & Katz, investment bank Goldman Sachs, and was selected to the White House Internship Program during the first year of the Obama Administration.

Soon after taking the position, Hollins, the youngest and first person of color to serve as Harris County Clerk, announced S.A.F.E., a 23-point voting access expansion program that included promotion of mail-in voting, expansion of early voting accessibility, and drive-through voting, which was a direct response to social distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hollins began receiving major local support for his efforts, capped by the Houston Rockets announcing in August that they were opening their arena (Toyota Center) as a voting location and their garage as a location for drive-in voting, beginning October 13, which was the first day of early voting in Texas.

In addition, Hollins was very transparent to his constituents and political peers along both party lines about the work he was doing. "Every Friday, I hosted a meeting with senior staff members from each Commissioners Court office, of which three of those offices were held by Democrats and two by Republicans," recalled Hollins. "I used those meetings to communicate our plans and any areas where my office required support."

He faced some political stonewalling from Republicans but kept pushing forward. "When I made my request for an expanded budget, I held individual meetings with each office to go over my plans in detail and ask for each office's vote in favor of my request," said Hollins. "Despite my attempts, both Republican commissioners voted against my budget, but it passed along party lines."

While Hollins had been working in this position for several months rather quietly, at least to the rest of the nation, the month of October would thrust him into the national landscape.

On October 1, Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, a staunch Republican, issued a proclamation directing counties to designate just one location for ballot drop-offs. The order placed Harris County into the national spotlight because it is larger than the size of Rhode Island and has 2.4 million registered voters but is being served by only one voting drop-box location.

Democratic officials nationwide saw this as a direct and overt sign of voter suppression. Hollins shared in that sentiment. "I was deeply disappointed that Gov. Abbott bowed to partisan pressure and broke his word to Texans," said Hollins. "It was his proclamation that originally allowed Texas to deliver their mail ballots in person and he changed the rules of the election last minute after caving to right-wing zealots who wanted to make voting more difficult, especially for communities of color." *Continued on next page*

Voting rights advocates and civic groups soon filed two separate federal lawsuits to block Abbott's order. Hollins decided to focus on voter education. "Our only option, besides litigation that had low odds of success, was to quickly educate voters about the rule change and to do our best to safety accommodate voters," said Hollins.

On October 10, a judge blocked the order to allow only one absentee vote drop-off point per county, on the basis that it would affect older and disabled voters. With just three days until early voting began, this judgement was very key in Hollins and the Democratic officials in Texas to halt Abbott's voter suppression.

On October 13, Harris County had an unofficial tally of 128,186 ballots received, the highest ever first day early voting count and over 5% of the county's registered voters. On October 29, several voting locations in Harris County were available for 24 hours to accommodate voters whose work shifts, or other responsibilities overlapped with regular voting hours.

When the election was over, Hollins, who had now become one of the national faces fighting against voter suppression during this election, helped triple early voting locations compared to the 2016 election, led one of the nation's first counties to have a 24-hour voting period and drive-thru voting system, and instituted safety precautions to protect voters and election workers during the COVID-19 pandemic.

1.44 million ballots were submitted in Harris County during the three-week early voting period, compared to the 1.3 million total voters who turned out during the 2016 presidential election. Hollins helped galvanize people to the polls with disseminating key information, but also with the assistance of several other entities. "We were fortunate to be able to forge partnerships with local organizations that provided rides to the polls, as well as with Lyft and LeBron James' More Than a Vote Foundation," said Hollins.

Hollins led Harris County through this pivotal time in its electoral history, all while simultaneously documenting and granting very important documents for Harris County residents, such as birth certificates, death certificates, property documents and marriage licenses, as County Clerk.

Now that his term is officially over, Hollins will return to his law firm Hollins Law Group PLLC and his Vice Chair role with the Texas Democratic Party, while also continuing his work in voting rights advocacy.

OMEGA MAN SHINES LIGHT INTO THE STREETS

Pro. Winfred D. 'Fred' Phillips was educated in the Hartford School System and later at Allen University, Columbia, South Carolina, where he graduated in 1976 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. While at Allen University, Fred was initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. through Mu Sigma chapter in 1974. There he was the President of the Pan-Hellenic Council, member of the basketball team, and held the distinction of being named the first Mr. Homecoming in the school's history.

After graduating, Fred returned to Connecticut and began his teaching career in the Bloomfield School System. In 1978, Fred changed careers and worked as a Human Resource Officer for the State of Connecticut for 12 years, before returning to his first love, working with youth. He worked as an

educator in the Meriden School System for 5 years, while also working as a Youth Services Officer for the State of CT at the CT Juvenile Training School at Long Lane for 20 years. He was honored for his years of distinctive service and named the 2002 Child Care Worker of the Year, while also serving as Union Steward and Delegate for AFSCME. Fred retired from the State of CT in 2012 and is presently active in the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Tau Iota Graduate Chapter in Hartford, and the Phillips Metropolitan CME Church in Hartford, where he has served numerous years on the Steward Board, recently completing 4 conference years as its Chair, or lead fiscal officer.

In 2016, Fred founded the grassroots organization, "Men Standing Up Against Violence" and is a member of "Calling All Brothers" Men Standing Up Against Violence was founded to "fill in the gaps" for the community's needs in the North-End of Hartford, CT. Phillips leads the members of his group into what he calls North End's "hotspots of crime" about 40 times a year, particularly on holidays and during city events when they see more activity and violence on the streets. They have conversations with youths, mediate conflicts, and deter crime.

His group has 40 active members, many of them are retired and volunteer full-time with the group. They know the areas and the people well because they grew up there. "It's our duty as people who grew up in the community to protect and serve," said Phillips.

When the COVID pandemic hit the Hartford community especially hard this Spring, Brother Phillips organized a COVID-19 supplies giveaway at Phillips Metropolitan C.M.E. Church in Hartford, CT. They handed out more than 200 meals and 2,000 face masks to members of the community. "Half the supplies had been donated by local pharmacies and catering companies", Phillips said. The other half was paid for out-of-pocket by members of the group. In addition to the work he continues to do with the chapter and Men Against Violence, Brother Phillips serves as Chairman of Phillips C.M.E Steward Board. He also is the first African American to Chair the Governor's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities. He serves on the Tau Iota Chapter Social Action and Achievement Week committees. He is a key leader in the Chapter's annual serving of Thanksgiving Day Meals, Turkey Drives, and Clothing Drives. He provided the location for the Annual Achievement Week Awards Night at Phillips Health and Wellness Center. Similar to the words from the Will Allen Dromgoole's, poem titled- "The Bridge Builder". Phillips continues to act as a Good Friend, in the path he has come. He is a Good Friend that is building a bridge for others.

AMID PANDEMIC EPSILON IOTA IOTA CHAPTER REFOCUSES ITSELF AND EXAMINES VOTER SUPPRESSION 2.0

In spite of COVID 19, the brothers of *Epsilon Iota Iota* continue to do the work of Omega. The deaths of Ahmaud Arberry, Breonna Taylor, and George Floyd has sparked a movement to end police violence and address systemic racism. In addition, the nation remains in a Pandemic and the brothers of Omega has followed COVID 19 protocol, but continued to have social programs. In May, the Social Action Committee of EII started an Omega Uplift Series. Every other Wednesday, we invited three or four panelists to discuss their area of expertise.

One brother moderates the event and another brother solicits questions from the chat and asked the panelists.

Amid Pandemic Epsilon Iota Iota Chapter refocuses itself and examines Voter Suppression 2.0 - Continued

In May of 2020, the chapter hosted its first Omega Uplift Series event and the topic was "COVID 19 and the Impact in the Black Community and What You Need to Do to Survive." The three panelists discussed how COVID 19 has disproportionately impacted the African American community. All the panelists agreed that health disparities were a function of systemic racism they need a systemic solution, such as affordable health care. The second Omega Uplift series was held on Wednesday, May 27th and "COVID 19 and What You Need to Do Survive Financially" addressed personal finances and the economic impact of COVID 19 on the black community. COVID 19 forced many small businesses to close and unemployment rates increase. The panelists urged the brotherhood to be cognizant of their credit score and how to make informed financial decisions. The third event covered the topic "How To Deal With Stress in Trying Times" and addressed mental health during the Pandemic and Black Lives Matter Protests. During the last few weeks there have been numerous images of dying black bodies. A number of Omega men across the country have been asked to discuss racism and inequality. Many brothers of EII have participated in marches, protests, and voter registration drives in New Haven County. On November 3, 2020, the work paid off and the Democratic Party won the White House and turned Georgia blue; this is only the first step because this nation had walked down this path before.

During Reconstruction Era (1865-1877), black and white republican politicians created policies that assisted black and white southerners. Black elected officials advocated black male and female suffrage and they supported public education. In Charleston, SC, black male voters elected a sheriff, desegregated the University of South Carolina, and had a black superintendent of schools. As soon as black voters had an impact on southern society southern



white Democrats wasted no time trying to suppress the black vote.

In order to prevent expanding black political power white southern Democrats passed policies to decrease the number of black voters. Southern Democrats passed the grandfather clause, that allowed black people to vote if their grandfather voted, literacy and understanding clauses, where white poll watchers required black voters to interpret the Constitution, and the poll tax, where black citizens had to pay a tax in order to vote. For example, the grandfather clause had a major impact in the number of black voters in Louisiana. In 1896, there were 130,000 black male voters and by 1904 there were 1,342.

In 1965, the Black Freedom Struggle forced the federal government to pass the Voting Rights Act. In fact, Bayard Rustin, a member of our beloved fraternity wrote a famous essay "From Protest to Politics" where he encouraged African Americans to engage in electoral politics. From 1965 to 2020, there have been a significant increase in the number of black congresspersons, Senators, and the nation elected a black president. During the last 55 years, the Republican Party have tried to limit the impact of the Voting Rights Act.

Black voting power reached its apex in 2008, when the nation elected Barack Obama, the nation's first black President. Obama inspired young black voters and they made a huge difference similar to 2020. However, Obama's election galvanized racist white voters and this resulted in the election of Donald Trump. In addition to racist rhetoric, Trump's victory was a result of the 2013 United States Supreme Court Case Shelby vs Holder. This case allowed states to redraw voting districts without obtaining federal clearance. As a result, southern states instituted new voter id laws, closed thousands of poll stations, and decreased early voting, a tradition that black communities have used to get out black votes. Black voting power was the reason why the Republican Party continues to support voter suppression.

Nu Psi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., was founded by Dr. Luther Porter Jackson on December 12, 1927 on the campus of Virginia State University in Petersburg, Virginia. Throughout his career, Dr. Porter not only contributed to our beloved Fraternity in many ways, he was also a strong proponent of the Civil Rights Movement and served as a distinguished faculty member at Virginia State University.

From his initiation in 1923 until he entered the Omega Chapter in 1950, Dr. Porter truly exemplified the four cardinal principles through his scholarly works and his community service. In accordance with Dr. Porter's vision of excellence, Nu Psi Chapter members have held several key positions within the Fraternity both at the District and National level. We have also continued to maintain our reputation as a premier Chapter known for our unique stepping and branding styles.

Conceptually, the committee's mission was to create a memorial that was very different from the existing organizational plots on VSU's campus and Omega plots across the country. The idea was to develop a design that required very little maintenance over time. Having committee members with backgrounds in Real Estate Development (Claggion #3 96) and Architecture (#12 96 Joseph), we were able devise a plan that included materials such as black granite and grey wall block to give the memorial a more distinct and classic appearance.

After attending numerous meetings with Virginia State University (VSU) over the course of 12 months, we were granted permission to proceed with the project.

Nu Psi also received unanimous approval by the Art and Architecture Review Board for the State of Virginia on 7/15/2020. *Continued on next page*



Further, during the approval process the committee was able to encourage the Chapter to participate in a successful fundraising campaign that exceeded our goals and provided the financial support to build the memorial. Within a 7-month period Nu Psi Chapter had collected the funds necessary to begin construction.

Throughout this process the committee made a concerted effort to ensure that our monument aligned directly with our Chapter traditions and the beauty of VSU's campus. Each side of the monument features historical aspects of Nu Psi Chapter and Omega Psi Fraternity, Inc., as a whole.

Since completion, our memorial has received recognition from VSU's Administration and other Chapters within Omega Psi Phi Fraternity across the country. Our memorial is a true reflection of Nu Psi's history and serves as a symbol of leadership that positively represents Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

Lastly, we thank Brother Jay Smith (86' Mu Epsilon) of Smith Family Monuments for providing the granite work that is featured in the memorial. This project is a true testament of bridge building and Omega men working together.



PHI PHI CHAPTER FEEDS OVER 4,500 DURING THANKSGIVING

or three weekends during the annual Thanksgiving season, the Phi Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc., holds food drives at three Kroger stores throughout the greater Richmond community (Short Pump 11895 West Broad St. Richmond, VA 23233, 9480 West Broad St Richmond, VA 23294 and 10800 Iron Bridge Rd Chester, VA 23831). In 2019, internal goal was to provide 800 Thanksgiving meals to families. Under the direction of our Committee Co-Chairs Brother Kenny Williams and Brother Terrell Fowler, and the support of Richmond, we exceeded our goal. Through semi perishable food and monetary donations, we received \$27,500.00 needed to be a blessing to 1150 families of four or more (4,500 people). This Service Project has grown tremendously since its humble inception. Five years ago, the Chapter impacted the lives of 8 families. Four years ago, Phi Phi fed 135 families and last year, 840 families. The partners on the community service project include Kroger, AARP Virginia, Arnold Bread Company, and the Coca Cola-Consolidated Bottling Company, as they all made significant contributions in support of the vision.

In 2015, and as a new initiate, Brother Kenny Williams quickly identified himself as a true conduent of service. His desire to not "just exist" on the Social Action Committee quickly caught the attention of the leadership team. A plan was quickly devised to maximize our current existence in the greater Richmond Community. While the first year was a huge success (135 families of four), the Chapter quickly identified it could do more and more were needed. 840 families were provided a complete Thanksgiving meal. Due to COVID-19, the 2020 food drive was halted amid safety concerns. This year, the Chapter was still able to impact the lives of 100 families of 4 or more. The current administration under the leadership of Basileus Charles "Chuck" Fordham and Committee Chair Brother Terrell Fowler, have already surpassed the previous benchmark. 

Bro. F. Tarkin Jones 3-GE-95 coordinated the event with assistance from Bro. Brandon Grooms 4-GE-02 and Bro. Josh Mangana 7-GE-04.

The participation was overwhelming, with over 215 Brothers attending and participating in the event. Brothers spanned 73 years of the chapter's existence of all ages, from our oldest chapter Brother Jerry T Hodges 4-GE-47 to the youngest chapter Brothers from the newly initiated 2020 line.

The undisputable highlight of the event was keynote speaker, Bro. Dr. L. Julian Haywood, the chapter's charter member. Bro. Haywood illustrated in detail the establishment of our beloved chapter and the first group of brothers he initiated as the charter line in 1947. When asked what qualities he was looking for in those first six Hampton students to be Omega men, Bro Haywood promptly responded he looked for men that were "serious, capable and had character". By the end of 1947, the chapter had 27 Brothers and the Light of the Third District began to shine brightly. After graduating from Hampton, he returned to Howard for medical school. He moved to California and arrived at Keck USC School of Medicine as a resident in 1956 and practiced academic medicine at the medical center continuously since that time. Most notably, he is credited with Digital heart rhythm monitoring which was developed for the purpose of detecting heart rhythm abnormalities in heart attack patients. The technology was developed and first implemented in 1969 in the Coronary Care Unit at L.A. County General Hospital, the first such facility on the west coast, established by Dr. Haywood in 1966. The physical console and related software were developed on-site to Dr. Haywood's specifications. For his outstanding contributions over 55 years on various aspects of cardiology and on providing outstanding service to the Los Angeles community, the Los Angeles County+ USC



Medical Center renamed their Coronary Care Unit to the Dr. L. Julian Haywood Coronary Care Unit in 2016.

After his speech, as a token of the chapter's appreciation, they presented him with a plaque, paid for his Lifetime Membership, and paid for a brick to be laid in his honor with his name inscribed at The Atrium located on the campus of Hampton University. Unfortunately, on December 24, 2020, Dr. Haywood entered Omega Chapter due to COVID-19. Gamma Epsilon knew at the time of the virtual event that they were truly blessed and honored to have him participate in the virtual event and hear him talk about establishing our chapter. However, after his transition, it makes it much more special to have been able to share this moment in his last year of life in the middle of a pandemic. Our thoughts and prayers are and will continue to be with his wife of 67 years, Betty and their son Tony. We will be eternally grateful to them for sharing him with us.

His speech was followed by a State of the Chapter in which the newly initiated brothers from GE 2020 provided an update on what was going on with the university and their current college experience in this type of environment to their older chapter brothers.

Brothers Kirk Weems 9-GE-85 and Derrick Lowery 22-GE-84, discussed the current state of the fraternity in terms of new initiatives, areas of concern, active undergraduate and graduate chapters and the financial impact this has on the fraternity as a whole.

Bro. Jones drilled down to address the current state of GE alumni and cited that although the chapter average of the 500+ Brothers that have come through GE that are financial, is above the national average, there is work to be done and room for improvement. In addition, Brothers were provided with names of graduate chapters in many of their respective areas they could consider in support of Reclamation and Retention. and illustrated the fact that numerous Brothers hold or have held prominent positions in their respective graduate chapters or districts. In fact, four of the newly chartered chapters in 2019, specifically in China, Tijuana, New Jersey and the Middle East each have charter members from GE.

This conversation led to a discussion on the transition from undergraduate to graduate chapters and stressed its importance. Bro Morris Brailsford 3-GE-12 highlighted how this effort also helps with retention and reclamation in aligning common goals such as graduating and becoming financial with a local graduate chapter. There has been a concentrated call to action for brothers to be financial and more engaged on the graduate and district levels. Furthermore, an initiative to utilize the Credit Union to get more Brothers as Lifetime Members has already helped some brothers achieve this status, and a strategy was created to help even more.

An update on the Gamma Epsilon Alumni Association was also given by Bro George White 6-GE-78 and Bro Kenny Jackson 8-GE-95. The association is the first Greek lettered organization to have such an association at their "Home By The Sea". The Gamma Epsilon Endowment Committee outlined the status of endowment funds which has raised almost \$100,000 since its inception. The endowment committee discussed plans to continue to give back to Hampton on an individual and corporate donor level in order to grow the endowment that supports scholarships for Gamma Epsilon undergraduates.

The Mentorship Committee outlined plans to connect undergraduate chapter members with alumni brothers through a formal mentorship program. This program is executed on a regional basis aligning undergraduate brothers with alumni brothers with similar career pursuits and passions. Furthermore, the Gamma Epsilon Alumni Association was approached to partner with the university for a Career Fair. Conversations are now being held to determine if this will be virtual in the near future or in-person after the pandemic is under control.

The Mental Health Committee reported on initiatives that align under the fraternity's "Brother You're on My Mind Initiative". The quarterly session is instrumental in brothers dealing with the stressors and challenges that come with living in a COVID environment.

The GE 75th Anniversary Committee outlined plans for the 75th Anniversary Gala to take place on February 12, 2022 at the Marriott Newport News, Virginia. The 75th Anniversary Gala will celebrate the chartering of the Gamma Epsilon Chapter on Hampton University's campus on February 12, 1947. The gala will be a black tie affair that connects the Gamma Epsilon Chapter's past to its future in honor of 75 years of being the "Light of the 3rd D".



4TH DISTRICT PROMOTES VOTER EDUCATION THROUGHOUT

B rothers throughout the Fourth District, under the direction of the 29th District Representative, Brother Lamar T. Cole, and appointed Voter Registration, Education and Mobilization (VREM) Committee chair, Brother Mayo Makinde, worked tirelessly to be a part of the most controversial and most discussed elections of all time. Across Ohio and West Virginia, Brothers of Omega worked in local communities to provide accurate information and resources needed to help ensure all registered voters could have their voices heard.

As a District, the Brothers of the VREM Committee and District Council organized and hosted a virtual town hall discussion titled "Black Votes Matter." The District partnered with the AIDS Healthcare Foundation for this virtual event that focused on the issues most impactful to the Black community, and more importantly, to discuss action items to achieve common goals. This virtual event was wide-reaching, as it was broadcast live; it also was recorded so that it can be viewed later. The event has been viewed over 1,000 times! Beyond this effort, the VREM Committee provided the framework for local chapters to safely execute "Roll to the Polls" events in their individual markets. Roll to the Polls encouraged individuals to drop off their mail-in ballots, early and in-person, to avoid expected delays or other obstacles. This campaign included letters written to nonprofit organizations to gain community buy-in, best practices to assure safety, and promotional materials for each chapters' event being made available.

Aligned with the District's efforts to connect with audiences in local communities by utilizing the virtual platforms, the Brothers of Beta Iota Chapter in Cincinnati, OH hosted a virtual session titled "Historic 2020 Elections." This conversation highlighted the importance of the 2020 election season, especially the impact of local elections on everyday life. The townhall discussion included elected officials, candidates running for office, and community members as panelists. The Brothers of Beta Iota also partnered with Psi Theta Chapter at the University of Cincinnati, Tau Xi Chapter at Miami University, and the Cincinnati graduate chapters of the National Pan Hellenic Council (NPHC), for a "Roll to the Polls" event at the Hamilton County Board of Elections.

In Southern West Virginia, Brothers from three chapters came together to work towards the District VREM goals. Brothers of Xi Alpha in Institute, Chi Alpha in Bluefield, and Psi Beta Beta in Huntington, worked in concert to register, educate, and mobilize voters. The Brothers in these communities helped host two physically distant and COVID-19 conscious drive-in movie nights, bringing out dozens of families in the greater Charleston community. These movie nights included screenings of the Marvel hit Black Panther, complete with pre-packaged candy and popcorn. The highlight of the event, however, was the opportunity to educate and provide literature on voting rights and registration status to the adults who attended. *Continued on page 66*

ZETA OMEGA'S PUREFOY REPRESENTS FOUNDER COLEMAN DURING FOUNDERS' DAY OBSERVANCE

In late October, in the midst of a global pandemic, battling for social justice and educating the community ahead of one of the most controversial national elections in history, Fourth District Representative, Brother Lamar Cole (1989 Psi Theta), began making calls to bring some exciting news to the brothers in the Cleveland, OH area as Founders' Day was approaching. His first call was to Zeta Omega Basileus, Brother Kendric Jackson (1993 Lambda Gamma). He explained that Grand Basileus Brother Dr. David Marion had sent out a call for District Representatives to submit names of senior brothers who were at least 80 years old and with at least 60 years of service to Omega, to potentially participate in a virtual Founders' Day celebration.

DR Cole further explained to Basileus Jackson that in responding to Brother Grand's request, he had submitted the name of one of the eldest and still very active, stalwart brothers in the Fourth District, Zeta Omega's Brother George Purefoy (1946 Zeta). The DR was happy to report that based on his record of service to Omega, Brother Purefoy was indeed one of the four elder brothers selected to participate in this unique and innovative event! Brother Purefoy would be representing Omega Founder Frank Coleman.

Basileus Jackson was given the honor of sharing this great news with Brother Purefoy himself. When he did, the elder Brother, affectionately known as "4-46-Zeta," confirmed that he was honored and definitely would participate.

The next step would be to set up a time and location to video record Brother Purefoy's Founders' Day message. To help organize this process, the DR enlisted the help of Brother Damon Scott (1990 Mu Iota). Brother Scott had twice interviewed Brother Purefoy; once for an Omega Legends article titled "The Three Georges of Zeta Omega" for The Oracle, and a second time as part of Zeta Chapter's Centennial Celebration at Virginia Union University's 2019 Homecoming. Brother Scott would help prepare Brother Purefoy for the script that he would recite for his Founders' Day message.

The last, and most important, component was the actual video recording of Brother Purefov. For this task, the services of Brother Reggie Ware (1983 Iota Psi) were enlisted. When contacted, Brother Ware, a professional videographer, was happy to lend his talents to this worthy project. The four Zeta Omega Brothers set up a conference call to work out all the details. Their preparation led them to properly mask up and meet with Brother Purefoy to record his message. After about a two hour session, Brother Ware had enough footage to work his video-graphic magic that resulted in a 90 second message that included 4-46-Zeta representing Founder Frank Coleman. It was included, along with messages from three other elder Brothers representing Founders Ernest Everett Just, Oscar James Cooper, and Edgar Amos Love, in a very impressive video presentation celebrating the 109th anniversary of the Birth of Omega. The presentation was aired on the Fraternity's YouTube channel on November 17, 2020. A link remains on the channel for Brothers and guests to view at their leisure.

When asked to share his thoughts about the experience, the well-respected Brother Purefoy, initiated into Omega 74 years ago, stated "It was indeed one of the greatest honors that can be bestowed upon a brother... to be afforded the opportunity to represent one of our great Founders, in this instance Founder Frank Coleman, for me."

The efforts in Columbus, OH saw the Brothers from Eta Nu Nu (formerly Zeta Beta) join with the undergraduate brothers from Iota Psi chapter at the Ohio State




University for their "Roll to the Polls" event. The brothers traveled through neighborhoods encouraging individuals to go vote and the brothers even provided beverages and snacks for those waiting to vote early in another event in Columbus, OH Brothers of Mu Iota chapter delivered a very clear message, that it is not just important to vote, but it's important to encourage everyone you know to vote as well. Mu Iota Basileus, Brother Kenneth Marshall was interviewed by local news stations where he emphasized the point that local politics affects the average citizen far more than what happens on the national level in Washington.

The Brothers of both chapters in the Greater Cleveland, OH area, Zeta Omega, and Zeta Kappa Kappa, joined forces in a unified front to accept an invitation from the ladies of the Greater Cleveland Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., (GCAC/DST). The two organizations joined forces to address three huge needs in their community: expanding access to free Covid-19/Coronavirus testing; registering people to vote, some for the first time, others for absentee/vote-by-mail applications; and, for completing the 2020 U.S. Census. The event, known as the Community Check-In and Check-Up, was the brainchild of GCAC/DST. Other cosponsors included Care Alliance Health Center, Black Nurses Rock Cleveland, the U.S. Census Bureau, the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, and the Cleveland State University Black Student Union. By the end of the event, Care Alliance had administered 111 tests, 31 community residents responded to the Census, 27 registered voters completed applications for absentee/vote-by-mail, and 15 people registered to vote for the first time.

The Fourth District is inspired to remain active in the political process by registering, educating and mobilizing our communities. This work is not complete simply because the 2020 general election is now complete. The Fourth District and chapters across Ohio and West Virginia will continue to push for more representation in elected positions at all levels of government.

he Legendary Fifth District (KY/TN) – The Men of the Legendary Fifth District conducted its second annual District Wide Blood drive in honor of Brother Dr. Charles R. Drew and to execute one of our Fraternity's mandated programs as part of the 5th District Achievement Week 2020 commemoration. The Undergraduate and Graduate Chapters partnered together to complete this Achievement Week project in our major cities.

Combining resources as a District to conduct simultaneous blood drives in our focus cities of Memphis, TN, Jackson, TN, Nashville, TN, Murfreesboro, TN, Chattanooga, TN, Knoxville, TN, Bowling Green, KY, Louisville, KY, Lexington, KY, Fort Knox, KY, Clarksville, TN and Cumberland University, TN versus having every chapter complete multiple blood drives at different times of the year. 

The Brothers of the Fifth hosted their first Fifth District Achievement Week Program honoring the accomplishments and heroes of the Legendary 5th District and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. This virtual celebration included a presentation of Fifth District historical milestones and the origin of our Omega's Achievement Week. One of the highlights of program was the presentation of the first Fifth District Living Legend Award, presented to Bro. Robert Jefferson the eighth Fifth District Representative, was a well-respected councilman who served the city of Lexington, KY 2nd District from 1988 until 2000.

Bro. Jefferson also was involved in getting Harry Sykes, the first black elected City Council Member in Lexington to be elected to the city council in 1963. Bro Jefferson was recognized in 2019 for the 20th anniversary of the Fairness Ordinance. On July 8, 1999, the city of Lexington outlawed discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity in housing, employment and public accommodations. This groundbreaking, county-wide ordinance was the first in Kentucky to provide these protections. Bro. Jefferson is now retired and resides in Lexington. He served in the Air Force from 1947 until 1954, has been a member of the board of the Lexington Urban League and has been involved in the Lexington community since 1957. Bro. Jefferson was initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. through the Psi Psi Chapter on the campus of Kentucky State University in 1955. The Legendary Fifth closed their Achievement Week with a virtual Worship Service hosted by the Fifth District Chaplain Bro Bishop Carter, III who blessed the Brotherhood with words of encouragement and ideas of gratefulness for our Fraternity and life achievements.

The Legendary Fifth District held its first Virtual Worship Service, observing the 109th Anniversary of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc. The district-wide service was a salute to Achievement Week, raising awareness of the invaluable contributions of the Chaplains within the District. Fifth District Keeper of Records and Seal Bro. Richard Thompson served as master of ceremony. Bro. Samuel P. ewly elected TN 15th District Representative is a "servant leader" with a heart for his community. Brother McKenzie, also the 23rd Fifth District Representative ran on a platform of equitable education opportunities, healthcare for all, criminal justice reform, and providing the opportunity for youth and work development. Representative Elect McKenzie believes that all children deserve quality education and teachers deserve quality pay. The current TN state voucher program is not the solution and he is vehemently opposed to this measure. Fully funding the Basic Education Program (BEP) would be a significant step toward improved outcomes in our urban schools.

Born and raised in Knoxville, TN. Bro. McKenzie along with his two brothers Reginald and Raleigh attended public schools and are proud graduates of Austin-East High School. Sam went on to attend Fisk University earning a B.S. in Physics and obtained his M.S. in Solid State Physics from the University of Memphis. Sam is a life member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Sam returned to Knoxville after college to start his 30+ year career at Oak Ridge National Laboratory. Sam has been involved in the community for many years in various capacities and serves on numerous boards. Sam enjoys officiating football at high school and collegiate levels and worked championship games at both levels. Sam is a proud husband, father and grandfather. Sam and his wife have a blended family of 6 children.

Brother McKenzie feels that all citizens deserve access to healthcare services and health insurance and that Medicaid Expansion is a step in the right direction to ensure funding is available to citizens of Knoxville. Currently, over 300,000 Tennesseans are without health insurance and hospitals are negativity impacted with several rural hospitals closing as a result, leaving those residents without services. McKenzie, is heavily influenced by the teachings of his father, a lifelong social worker reasons that there must be an aggressive focus on breaking the prison pipeline and this can be accomplished with strategic investment in rehabilitation and preventive services. He is determined to develop preventive programs for young children and teens partnering with guidance counselors and juvenile court systems to identify at risk youth. Bro. McKenzie is focused on supporting adult rehabilitative and transitional housing that is critical to ensure those coming out of incarceration have a safe and stable environment. Partnerships with companies willing to provide internships is a major component and these measures will decrease recidivism and reduce crime.

McKenzie's goal is to propose legislation to repeal laws that incarcerate individuals for low level drug offensives, McKenzie truly believes that people deserve a second chance. The 15th District encompasses a full socioeconomic spectrum. From the affluent to the minimum wage workers Sam's goal is to close the gap between this spectrum. At the end of the day the people of the 15th District are hard-working and deserve a true Living Wage. This can be done through recruitment and incentives that foster quality jobs and business development opportunities. Sam has worked with both ends of the wage equation and will put the full weight of this position to move the 15th Forward! Workforce Development is key!

FEED THE VOTE

D rothers of Epsilon Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. partnered with First Baptist Church-Broad and the NAACP to provide food, voter awareness, and COVID-19 testing to the of Binghampton Community in Memphis Tennessee. These men assembled 150 food boxes consisting of dairy, fruit, vegetable, and poultry products and distributed the food boxes to those individuals seeking COVID-19 Participants were able to drive through the food distribution line and the food was placed in their cars for them, for their convenience. After they picked up their food boxes then the participants were directed to a line where they could then go and receive their COVID-19 test. The food boxes also included flyers informing individuals of early voting dates and also the date for general voting, as well as a link where they could locate their voting precinct and locations.







The event took place on Saturday October 24, 2020. The current Global Pandemic has placed numerous restrictions upon daily life and has been proven through research to have a greater and more devastating impact on people of color. With Memphis having such a significant African-American population these restrictions have impacted the community both economically and socially. This includes the Democratic process of the vote during this 2020 election. More Black communities may feel disenfranchised when it comes to voting and the ability to get out and vote, so creating voter awareness and providing information on where and when to get out and vote is just as vital. With the current pandemic there is even a greater need to coordinate activities that can support an increase in COVID-19 testing within the Black Community, African Americans in Shelby County, in which Memphis is located, have over a 60% positivity rate and account for 65% of the death rate of those who have contracted the virus.

While living in New York, Memphis Jazz Workshop founder Bro. Stephen Lee had the privilege of meeting and befriending several talented young musicians. Not long after meeting these young



musicians, Lee noticed that they were operating at a higher skill level at a very young age compared to their counterparts. They were incredible performers who were hanging with jazz legends at world-renowned jazz clubs, and most were enrolled in performing arts schools. It was very clear these musicians benefitted from extra mentorship, private lessons and group practices – things that the average public school music program cannot provide. "Not everyone wants to be a doctor or lawyer" said Lee. Some kids want to be professional musicians and make a living playing jazz, and I hope I can help them make their dreams become a reality. A big part of my job is to show students the steps they need to take to achieve their goals and use my personal experiences as an example." Lee said, or; "Even if it's not a professional pursuit, there are so many life skills that you learn in jazz improvisation – confidence, self-motivation, work ethic, time management, self-awareness, critical listening. It's more than simply learning how to play an instrument."

After moving to Memphis in 2009, Lee taught public school for three years then moved on to working with nonprofit arts organizations like Visible Music School and Memphis Music Initiative. As he became more curious about how nonprofits work, he sought counsel from a friend who is an expert in that space. What he took away from those conversations was that nonprofits address a need that isn't being attended to in the community, rather, they solve a problem. The problem he identified was that there was nowhere to learn the history and legacy of jazz in Memphis. He saw the need for young musicians to learn the music of jazz and performance skills specific to the genre. Lee knew that he could provide an opportunity for kids to play jazz on a more elite level. He also knew that students could benefit from the wealth of knowledge he had accumulated over the past 20-plus years as well as his connections to some of the genre's most talented and well-respected artists. Seeing that learning gap, and armed with confidence in his own abilities, Lee knew that he was ready to transition into something more impactful in music education. He wanted to make a difference in the lives of young musicians. From there, Memphis Jazz Workshop was formed in 2016. The first camp was held in summer 2017 at Visible Music School. It was free of charge and catered to 20 students. Since that first camp, MJW has experienced steady growth. Enrollment has doubled year over year and there are now 70 students in the after-school program and 80 students in the summer program. The Memphis Jazz Workshop has experienced growth in other ways as well, having performed at approximately 65 events around the city since its launch. In addition, every high school senior enrolled in the program has graduated and entered college. And, as of 2019, Memphis Jazz Workshop has partnered with the Memphis Mayor's MPLOY summer jobs program, which paid 50 students to participate in the summer workshop. Memphis Jazz Workshop has come a long way in a short time, but the journey is just beginning. The organization seeks continued growth in engagement, enrollment and support from the community. The bigger vision will revolutionize learning in Memphis as Lee looks to one day build a performing arts school which will rival the Duke Ellington School of Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. or Lincoln Center School in New York.

SPECIAL AGENT COLTER

AN INTERVIEW

Special Agent Eddie Colter is a graduate of The Citadel, class of '90, where he pledged the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., Beta Mu Chapter, in the spring of 1989. After serving six years on active duty with the South Carolina Army National Guard, Colter joined the U.S. Secret Service as a Special Agent. During his nearly 27 years of service, he distinguished himself by serving on multiple Presidential and Dignitary protective details to include Presidents Clinton, Bush, Obama, and numerous foreign heads of state and government. Now a senior leader in the agency, Colter is the Special Agent in Charge of the Secret Service's Liaison Division at the Secret Service Headquarters in Washington, D.C. He resides in the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area with his wife and two children.

Q: What inspired you to pursue a career in the USSS?

A: From a very early age, I wanted to be in law enforcement. I grew up in the small town of St. Matthews, South Carolina where the South Carolina Highway Patrol left quite the impression on me. They had a reputation of being all business while still helping others. I knew that was the kind of job that I wanted to do. My parents raised my three siblings and me to be respectful, treat others the way you want to be treated, and to help others. That was what inspired me to want to be in law enforcement/military.

I was also inspired by the advice and encouragement from my college faculty advisor and mentor, Dr. Gardel Fuertado – the former Dept. Head of the Political Science Department at The Citadel. He had an impressive career with the federal government and shared some of his very unique and extraordinary experiences that I found captivating and inspiring. Finally, the cardinal principles of my fraternity- Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift, along with the lifelong friendships I developed throughout my life and career, have also been as inspiring.

Q: What do special agents do?

A: We have a dual mission. We provide protection of the nation's highest leaders (President, First Family, Vice President, Second Family, Foreign Heads of State and Government (and their spouses) We also investigate fraud against our nation's financial and payments systems such as counterfeiting, bank, computer, and access device fraud, and cyber-crimes. Every agent begins his or her career by doing both investigations and protection. The more experience you gain, the more responsibility you are given. Depending on the office you start in determines the amount investigative and protective experience you will receive.

Q: What do you like most about your job?

A: The sheer uniqueness of the Secret Service mission – both investigations and protection.

Throughout the course of my career, as a young agent, I've conducted million dollar fraud investigations, and testified in an international federal criminal court. Perhaps more excitingly, I witnessed President Obama receive the Nobel Peace Prize in Oslo, Norway; shook the hand of Nelson Mandela; and now, supervising the protective detail for the spouse of Vice-President Kamala Harris, Because of my job, I've protected the world's most powerful leaders, traveled the globe, and witnessed history before my eyes.

Q: What impact has being a part of Omega Psi Phi had on you?

A: I entered The Citadel, Military College of South Carolina, in 1986. At that time, the institution was all male and predominately white. African-Americans only made up about 5% of the cadet population on campus so we literally all knew each other. It was during that very difficult and challenging time that I got to know the men of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. I found the fraternity's cardinal principles: Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift, along with the way I was raised, significant in my growth as a young man and my successes in life. As a black male, I live 'Manhood' each and every day. As a recent graduate of the American University KEY Executive Leadership

Certificate Program, I continue the pursuit of 'Scholarship' attainment in order to make me and those around me better. I 'Persevere' continually in order to survive for many reasons that inspire me and hopefully others. Lastly, I am committed to the 'Uplift' of others, which is key to creating progress and positive momentum for all. Being a member of Omega Psi Phi has taught me that life is a series of accomplishments and I am living proof.

Q: What is it like being an African American Special Agent? Is it a diverse workforce?

A: When I began my career as a new agent in 1993, before long, it became apparent that workforce diversity needed to improve. It was most noticeable within the special agent ranks. Since that time, the organization

has made noticeable progress with regards to equal opportunity, like developing engaging programs to educate the workforce, implementing more effective measures of accountability, and continually making a deliberate effort to recruit qualified diverse personnel. The organization even revised how employee performance is evaluated, as well as how they are assessed for promotions and reassignments. We aren't perfect - no organization is – but progress has been made. As long as we continue to focus on building and maintaining a qualified and diverse workforce, the Secret Service will continue to improve and remain a unique agency worth serving.

Q: Are Special Agents a certain "type" or personality?

A: No, we all have very diverse backgrounds, which I believe strengthens us. There are agents with all types of personalities: outgoing, adventurous, quiet, and reserved. Regardless, we all have strong work ethics and attitudes that don't allow us to quit when things get challenging. Those things, along with a high degree of integrity, separate us from everyone else.

Q: What's your most memorable experience from your time in the Secret Service?

A: The most memorable moment in my career was when Nelson Mandela came to Washington D.C. in late 1994 as the first black president of South Africa. I was a very young agent standing post in front of the Blair House (President's Guest House) when his motorcade pulled up. It was a state visit so it was high profile and a very big affair for all. I remembered being kind of scared, but in awe at the same time. When he got out of the limo, the first thing he did was walk over to a very large and excited crowd, shook everyone's hands, and hugged them. I was just amazed at what I was seeing. After that, he walked up the steps to the Blair

House where I had moved just inside of the front door. As a young African American agent, knowing the history of apartheid in South Africa, I was almost frozen as he came closer. Surprisingly, he stopped, looked me directly in the eyes, and reached out and shook my hand. I could not believe what had just happened. That was the most memorable

thing on the job out of my nearly 27 years. There were others, but that had to be the most memorable.



1ST BLACK SHERIFF OF COBB COUNTY

Omega Man becomes the 1st Black Sheriff of Cobb County, GA, November 4th, 2020, was one of the most important elections that many Americans have ever seen. This election wasn't important just for the President ial candidates, this included many local candidates as well. Specifically, for the Cobb County, GA ballot, Bro. Craig Owens made history as the 1st Black Sheriff elected for Cobb County. Bro. Owens is an

initiate of "The Elite" Chi Gamma Gamma chapter of the 7th District, #4-2012. He is married with two children. Bro. Owens holds multiple degrees and certificates of scholarship mostly from institutions in his home state of GA. He has over 30 years of police experience from the Cobb County Police, Military Police, and in the U.S. Army as a Division Commander of over 14,000 troops in the USA, Afghanistan, and S. Korea. Bro. Owens was inspired to run for the Cobb County Sheriff position while working in the local police department. He had discussions with other members of law enforcement magnifying issues stemming from the Sheriff's department. The disconnect between the Sheriff's department and the local community was alarming. There were over 50 deaths in the detention centers with the current Sheriff at the time. Families of the victims were not receiving proper communication or closure of what lead up to the deaths on the previous Sheriff's watch.

Bro. Owens believed it was time to impact the community by running for Sheriff to bring honor and integrity to the position. His biggest hurdle to persevere through was learning how to be a politician. He realized his experience in the law enforcement and military

campaigning wasn't quite as transferable to political campaigning. Bro. Owens surrounded himself with the right team and the support of the Fraternity, he came out victorious in the election, but not prior to setting a few records. Bro. Owens received the most votes of any candidates for any position on the Cobb County ballot. This confirms that even Republican voters believed in his integrity to bring honor to the position. He was the first candidate to be disqualified from the running based on not producing a high school degree document, and then was able to return to the ballot and win the primary against two additional candidates without a run-off election needed. When the election was over, he said "This was an extremely stressful experience but honored that the hard work didn't go to waste". Bro. Owens stated that the key objectives in the role early on include but are not limited to:

- Revamping the detention center's security measures;
- Forensic audit of historical fund allocations;
- Eliminate the 287 program that assist the Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (I.C.E.) agency and reallocate those resources; and
- Bridge the communication gap in multiple minority communities to rebuild comradery and trust.

He knows his work has just begun but with the support of the fraternity surrounding him, he will see it through!

THE C. BURSE INITIATIVE

The year of 2020 has no doubt been an interesting and challenging one on many fronts; the global pandemic known as Covid-19 has created unusual circumstances for us all. One of new challenges created from the fallout of Covid-19 is Virtual Learning in the K-12 public school system. Having always been a huge proponent and supporter of the local school system in Canton, Mississippi, Epsilon Kappa Kappa saw a void and stepped up to address and fulfill a need for students in and around our base of service. Brother Creston Burse approached chapter leadership with the thought of assisting students with needs created by the development of Virtual Learning instruction and the sometimes-exorbitant costs that can be associated with that method of delivery. After conducting a needs assessment in the five square block radius of the Uplift Center, several households were chosen to assist with internet service. Additionally, two young scholars who regularly attend community events at the Uplift Center were brought to the attention of the Brothers as remarkably bright students with outstanding academic prowess; however, they lacked the devices needed to fully participate in the District's Virtual Learning program.

Upon completion of the needs assessment and having a fruitful discussion amongst Brothers, Bro. Creston Burse made the suggestion that we adopt/mentor these two young scholars and assist them with their iPads and internet service in order to keep them fully engaged and immersed in their academic studies. Brothers paid the technology fees for the two scholars as well as assisted and followed through with their guardian on setting up a discounted internet service provider and allowed them access to the wireless signal at the Uplift Center. In addition, Bro. Melvin Bonds, Bro. Creston Burse, and Bro. Kelly Martin provided tutoring sessions to familiarize the scholars with their new devices as well demonstrate how to navigate the various applications used for classroom instruction. While conducting a planning session trying to decide how else we could get the most bang for our buck and have an impact on students in a similar situation, the perfect opportunity fell into our lap. An educator who happened to be within earshot of the discussion chimed in and stated that her school was in desperate need and just so happened to be one of the schools that we often work with locally.



After a vigorous discussion, the Brothers issued a challenge to the Scholarship Committee to generate and make a significant monetary donation to assist McNeal Elementary in short order. Using some good old-fashioned ingenuity, committee members tapped into some well-respected and historic institutions in and around Canton to provide assistance for this worth endeavor. Within 24 hours, \$1,200.00 dollars were raised in support of this campaign and within 72 hours, \$2,800.00 dollars was placed in an envelop and on its way to Principal Dr. Shana Whitehead at McNeal Elementary School. Even as Brothers sat in the office awaiting to deliver the bestowment, checks were being delivered from out of state to contribute to the initiative. When it was all said and done, a grand total of \$3,500.00 dollars was awarded to cover the technology and device fees for students at McNeal Elementary and They now have 100% student participation in their Virtual Learning program becoming the first school in the district to achieve this feat. As a result of what we have named the C. Burse Initiative, nearly 100 students were able to secure educational devices (iPads/Chromebooks) and have their technology fees waived via the donation from EKK. Also, Brothers have pledged to track, encourage, and support the two young scholars. We will assist them from their current grade-levels, through the completion of their high school studies in order to assure that they are never found lacking for the tools necessary for their future successes.

In tandem with Dr. Brown's presentation, the chapter targeted needs in the local Wiregrass community. KBB partnered with KBB Brother LaDray Gilbert's law firm and the Wiregrass Omega Lamplighters and made a special donation. The Royal Special Heart Food Pantry, founded by Z'yon Norton, daughter of KBB Brother Rafeal Norton, received a \$2,500 check to assist her in providing meals for first responders and other essential employees during the Covid-19 pandemic. The pantry was, initially, created to help feed Z'yon, a 9-year-old critical heart patient and less fortunate classmates that were going hungry at times. Based on KBB's contribution, Ms. Norton intends to extend her efforts of giving to make her community a better place. In addition to helping feed essential workers the Chapter also provided financial assistance as well.

Kappa Beta Beta sponsored the tuition of the child of an essential worker that has been experiencing financial setbacks due to lack of hours. The Beulah Land Academy, housed at Greater Beulah Baptist Church of Dothan, Alabama, received a check for \$1,500 to cover the cost of a year's tuition to ensure that a child's education would not be interrupted due hardships caused by the pandemic. The church's Pastor, Darryl Roberts, is also a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc. A native of Memphis, Tennessee, Pastor Roberts has been active with KBB since taking on his new post at Beulah and vows to continue to work with the Chapter to provide relief efforts during the pandemic.

MISSISSIPPI ORGANIZATION COMBATS COVID-19

Leta Tau, Nu Xi, Delta Mu Nu, Theta Iota Iota, and Epsilon Kappa Kappa, and Psi Mu Mu in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Agriculture were able to provide boxes of fresh produce and/or proteins to Mississippi residents in Fayette, McComb, Meridian, Southaven, and Canton. Since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Brothers have developed a partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture to provide free boxed protein/produce to citizens. The protein/produce is to help families and the elderly supplement their diet with meats and fresh fruits/vegetables amid the rising costs of feeding a family all while people are being laid-off and struggling to pay bills during these uncertain times.

In addition to the boxes provided via the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Brothers cultivated a relationship with the Mississippi Department of Health and provided PPE and free on-site Covid-19 testing at these various venues. Eta Tau/Nu Xi - Mask and Produce Box Distribution. Brothers partnered with the Mississippi Department of Health and Department of Agriculture to provide over 3,000 masks and 600 protein and produce boxes to the residents of Natchez, MS. Tobacco-free Mississippi was also on hand to provide literature on the dangers of smoking and tips on how to quit the terrible habit, and 40 residents were tested for Covid-19. Delta Mu Nu-Mask/Produce Box Distribution and Free Covid-19 Testing. Over 2,000 masks and 500 boxes of produce were distributed to the residents of McComb. Additionally, over 20 residents were tested for Covid-19. Theta Iota Iota - in partnership with the Mississippi State Department of Health and the Meridian Envision Center. Over 116 families received PPE kits.

The Brothers of the Theta Iota Iota Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. have been working with the Envision center on the Strong Families Initiative, Fatherhood Initiative, and Voter Registration, Education, and Mobilization (VREM) initiatives. Epsilon Kappa Kappa – in partnership with Mississippi Department of Health collected a total of 3,500 face masks for adults and children and 1,000 bottles of hand sanitizer to be distributed in the City of Canton. Having built a strong and gratifying relationship with The Canton Housing Authority, Epsilon Kappa Kappa reached out to Stanford Beasley (Executive Director) to determine where our efforts could be most beneficial. After thorough planning and preparation, the brothers of Epsilon Kappa Kappa decided on a three-pronged approach to serve the citizens of Canton with a face mask and hand sanitizer distribution day.

The Uplift Center served as the headquarters and distribution point for the community service effort. Teams of volunteers including members of the Madison County Greek Council and Anderson Lodge 9 F & AM were dispersed throughout the city to distribute the PPE packets via a knock-and-drop delivery method. Teams visited the Joe Prichard Homes, Pat Doherty Homes, Lula B. Covington Retirement Apartments, and Camden Park Apartments delivering adult and child packages to every unit. The on-site drive thru distribution at The Uplift Center allowed residents to drive up to distribution points on either side of the street and receive bags containing five (5) masks, a bottle of hand sanitizer, and



voter registration forms. While Brothers and community service partners were manning the drive thru stations, others walked a two-block radius from the Uplift Center passing out PPE packets and protein boxes to members of the Southside community along Cameron, Tuteur, Lee, and South Hickory Streets.

At the conclusion of the day, the brothers of Epsilon Kappa Kappa distributed 3,500 masks, 1,000 bottles of hand sanitizer, 500 voter registration forms, 85 protein boxes and fed over 100 first responders. Psi Mu Mu-Tough Covid-19 times have left thousands in the Mid-South without access to healthy food and needed products. But the Mid-South food Bank has been helping as many people as they can with their Mobile Food Bank Drives. In a normal month, the Mid-South Food Bank distributes about 1.3 million pounds of food to families in Memphis and the surrounding area. The Psi Mu Mu Chapter sorted and packed food, helped direct traffic, and loaded cars with the needed food.

Brother Johnson credits Brother Latrell Wrightsell for getting him into officiating.

"Latrell has played a huge role in my development as a ref. Without him, I would not be taking part in this industry and would not have been a part of this moment. He is a bridge-builder. I thank him for that."

As far as his feelings about being selected to be part of the first all-black officiating crew in Nebraska high school football history Brother Johnson said the following, "It was pretty monumental to be part of history and to be thought of so highly by my colleagues that they felt I should be one of the officials to be selected for this tremendous honor, it means a lot to me."

Brother DeRone Buffington, who served as the Political Organization Coordinator for the Detroit Department of Elections was responsible for overseeing all poll challengers. His duties included





Paradise Memorial Funeral Home organized "Limos to the Polls" to transport people to and from polling locations. For voter Dawn Coltrain, the experience made her feel like a movie star.

"We want to eliminate every excuse," said Funeral Homeowner Marcel Clarke. "Any barrier, any reason that would hinder or distract people from getting to the polls." After each ride, the driver cleaned and sanitized the seats, doors, handle, backrest, and windows.

The 2020 Achievement Week activities concluded with presenting Pastor Paul Lawrence Binion (Westside Church of God) with the Citizen of the Year Award.

DESERT QUES HELP TURN ARIZONA BLUE

With the 2020 elections having such an acute impact on people of color, Phi Iota's Basileus Bro. Larry Lopes, placed the full complement of the chapter's resources at the disposal of the Political Action chairman, Bro. Benjamin Johnson. Bro. Johnson blended the chapter's technical expertise and manpower with local agencies such as the State and County Democratic Party, the NAACP, the Divine 9 Pan-Hellenic organizations, 100 Black Women and representing Latinx, Native American and Asian. Together, these alliances were able to wage a relentless eight-month educational campaign to inforeducate, and encouraging new voters about Arizona's Ballot Initiatives, the voting process encouraging voters to cast their ballot by mail and participate in early voting. The comprehensive campaign consisted of informative emails, social distanced activities, consider CDC compliant rallies, webinars and ZOOM town halls that countered the restrictions caused by the pandemic.

The crown jewels of the campaign were the weekly webinars and ZOOM calls initiated and moderated by Bro. Johnson, coordinated by Bro. Danny L. White, and produced by Phi Iota's Vice Basileus, Bro. Jeffrey Birthwright. The virtual town halls featured a veritable "Who's Who" with one webinar recording approximately 600 participants and reports of thousands receiving the weekly messages via Facebook and other social media outlets. Remarks were received from then Vice Presidential candidate Soror Kamala Harris, and featured speakers included House Majority Whip Hon. Bro. James Clyburn, Arizona Secretary of State, Hon. Katie Hobbs, Maricopa County Recorder Adrian Fontes, representatives of senatorial candidate Mark Kelly, Omega Psi Phi's Grand Basileus David Marion, 12th District Representative Bro. Kwame Dow, Omega's International Political Action Chair and former DR, Bro. Sedrick Spencer, 32nd First Vice Grand Basileus Bro. Carl A. The need to bring a little uplift to the community spoke to him. Quishenberry said, "Watching the news, I saw the long food lines of folks who had lost their jobs and tried to think of a way for our chapter to do something to help people out in this COVID-19 environment, while at the same time, keeping our members safe."

Known as the "Rose Bowl Ques," Quishenberry said that service and developing community-based partnerships is what drove Zeta Tau Chapter's determination to add a month-long food drive to its service programs.



The chapter gave out about 25 bags of canned goods and other staple items to the pantry for its use in meeting the food needs of our neighbors and friends. The food drive culminated in the donation of canned goods and "bags and bags of shelf staple items to the Friends in Deed Food Pantry," he said.

The Pantry provides food weekly to over 400 low-income and no-income families in the Pasadena/Altadena area.

"The food collected by the Omegas will go a long way in helping us provide folks with not only good quality meal but substantial amounts of food per week," said pantry director Tim Nistler. "We do this 51 out of 52 weeks a year."

Nistler said making sure our community gets good quality food is a priority for Friends In Deed and donations from groups like the Omegas is very helpful.

"We couldn't do it without groups like yours," he added.



THE MEMOIR OF BROTHER JAMES HYLAND HAYES, JR.

APRIL 26, 1892 - MARCH 13, 1916

In writing The History of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Herman Dreer notes in the Preface that:

"the records of the Fraternity are incomplete, and probably will always be so. In the early days, the Brothers had no files. Records were kept on scraps of paper and in composition and memorandum books."

There are many mysteries in Omega. This answers one of them. To quote Dreer, this story is one of Omega's unknown "precious treasures."

James Hyland Hayes, Jr. was born into achievement. The first child of James Hyland Hayes, Sr. and the former Julia C. Harris, James Jr. was born on April 26, 1892, in Richmond, VA. Both born in the waning years of slavery, his parents were educated and prominent members of the Richmond African American community. His mother, Julia, graduated from Richmond Normal School (RNS) with distinction in 1878. RNS was established in 1867, through the financial assistance of the Freedmen's Bureau, to train African American students for the teaching profession. Julia taught grade school starting in 1879 at several of Richmond's segregated schools, including the famed Navy Hill School, the Baker School, and Moore School. In 1888, Julia Harris accepted an instructor position at the newly established Virginia Normal and Collegiate Institute (V.N.&C.I. now Virginia State University), becoming the lead teacher in its Model School that focused on the education needs of "little ones from 6-12 years of age." In the April 1896 V.N.&C.I. Gazette, she notes:

"In our "Model School" we strive to walk hand-in-hand with nature, by presenting such objects, and using such guides and helps as will naturally coincide with child-nature, and thus stimulate enthusiasm and a hunger and thirst for knowledge."

The foundation for Julia's children's academic success is rooted in her educational philosophy. At the close of the 1896 school year, Julia resigned from V.N.&C.I. to raise her two children. Shortly after her resignation, she accepted a position on Board of Directors of the newly established Woman's Union, an auxiliary business of the Independent Order of St.

Luke, an African American fraternal order. The Union was an insurance "fund for sickness, accident, and death" ran entirely by black women and co-founded by famed African American entrepreneur, Maggie Lena Walker, who also served as Vice President and Board Member (side note: Maggie's son, Melvin, was a member of Omega being initiated through the Camp Howard Chapter in 1918. He's also helped establish Zeta Chapter at Virginia Union University in 1919, where the



Chapter was born in his mother's home and served as its first Keeper of Seals). James Hyland Hayes, Sr. can be considered one of the most impactful civil rights activists you never heard of. An 1875 graduate of RNS, James Sr. was one of ten African Americans to secure a teaching position in the Richmond Public School (RPS) system (vs. 94 white teachers) despite 38% of students being African American. James Sr. taught the first and third grades at Navy Hill School until 1883. At Navy Hill, he was first introduced to his future wife, Julia, as they were part of the 15-person teaching staff from 1879 to 1881. In 1883, James Sr. was appointed Principal of the Valley School as

part of the progressive Readjuster Party, taking control of the school board. Along with J. H. Johnston and A. V. Norrell, he became one of the first African American principals in the RPS system (note: these three men occupied three of the thirteen principal positions in the RPS system). When Democrats retook control of the school board in 1884, James Sr. was relieved as Principal because of his color and political affiliation.

Seeking to change the disenfranchisement of African Americans he experienced, he was admitted to Howard University's School of Law in the fall of 1884, where, due to his professional experience and education, he earned advanced placement resulting in him being awarded a Bachelor of Laws degree in 1885.

Upon returning to Richmond in 1885, James Sr. impact was immediate. He ran and won a seat on the Common (City) Council of Richmond in 1886 representing the predominately African American Jackson Ward, a seat he would hold for two years. He was one of the founding partners of the African American newspaper, the Richmond Planet. He was assigned the task of chartering Virginia Seminary and College in 1886 (now Virginia University of Lynchburg and was the defense attorney in the high profile case of William Muscoe, a black man accused of killing a white police officer. He was editor of the Negro Advocate, a publication under the Negro Industrial and Agricultural Society, President of the National Negro Suffrage League, and member of the Executive Board of the Independent Order of St. Luke. He was received and met with Presidents Benjamin Harrison, William McKinley, and Theodore Roosevelt several times to advocate African American appointments in Federal positions and Black officers in the military. In 1902, African American leaders unsuccessfully lobbied President Roosevelt to appoint James Sr. as assistant attorney general for the Eastern District. In 1905, Roosevelt offered James Sr. the post of Consul to Guadeloupe, a position that he declined, citing his current work in the African American suffrage movement. In 1902, James Sr. filed a suit against the Commonwealth of Virginia to overturn its newly revised constitution citing that it denied Blacks the right to vote. This case would eventually reach the U.S. Supreme Court in 1904, where the constitution was upheld. James Sr. became a staunch advocate for Black voter rights and was a sought after speaker on African American disenfranchisement. He was one of the few African Americans selected as a delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1904. In 1906, James Sr. left the Republican Party due to their lack of support for African American candidates. He joined the fledgling Progressive movement spearheading the Black voter drive for the Roosevelt-Johnson ticket in 1912. He also penned a stirring 2-page op-ed in The Crisis magazine on why African Americans should be progressives in the November 1912 issue. In January 1917, with the advent of the U.S. entry into WWI, he testified before the Senate Committee on Military Affairs regarding universal military training for Blacks.

Simply put, James Sr. and Julia were the rare African American power couple of its day. Their influence and parenting will have a profound impact on their children. They married on September 4, 1889, with James Jr. born in 1892 and his brother, George Edward Chalmers Hayes, born two years later in 1894.

James Jr., known as Hyland to his friends and family, began his formal education in the segregated Richmond Public School system in 1896, attending the Brook School for his elementary schooling. In May 1900, Julia Hayes received a coveted federal appointment in the U.S. Census office as a clerk. This move required her to move to Washington, D.C., which she did with her family. However, they maintained their home in Richmond, having duel residences, a rarity for any family, black or white, at the time. While Julia's appointment within the Census Bureau ended in 1902, the family stayed in Washington with Hyland, attending the Garnet School located on the now famed U Street corridor in D.C.. Their neighbor, Thomas Marshall Dent, Sr., was an attorney and Howard Law School alumni graduating a year before James Sr. in 1884.

In a precursor of friendship-to-brotherhood, his sons, Francis and Thomas Jr., who was of similar age to Hyland and his brother George, and playmates, would both become fraternity Brother to Hyland with Thomas being initiated through Alpha Chapter in 1915 and Francis through Gamma Chapter in 1917, becoming one of Gamma's early initiates.

In 1905, Hyland was promoted to high school attending the famed M Street High School in D.C. (now Dunbar High School). Here, again, the intersection of friendship and future brotherhood crossed. Hyland participated in the Separate Battalion of High School Cadets upon entering M St HS. He became a private in Company B, where a sophomore Frank Coleman served as his Sargent. Coleman served as Hyland's commanding officer in the Cadet Corp until his graduation in 1908. At that time, Coleman reached the rank of Captain, Co. B, obtaining the highest rank for a cadet and leading the company, with Hyland serving as one of his officers, achieving the rank of Sargent in 1907-08 and 1st LT in 1908-09. While in HS, Hyland also became a student in the Washington Conservatory of Music, a private music academy founded in 1903 to train African Americans in music (predominately, classical European music), where he participated in the end-of-season recital in June 1906. Hyland graduated from M St HS on June 18, 1909, where, in a joint graduation ceremony with Armstrong Manual Training School, the newly elected President of the U.S., William Howard Taft, was one of the graduation speakers. While no information is yet known as to Hyland's academic prowess, it is reasonable to assume that his academic record was stellar. After graduating from M St, he applied to and was accepted at the University of Pennsylvania after passing a "rigorous examination."

During his time at Penn, Hyland faced difficulty academically and personally. With a new environment completely different than M St., he struggled academically his freshman year. Then, towards the end of his freshman year, he was struck with typhoid fever and granted leave from Penn until the fall to recover. After convalescing during the summer and overcoming his illness, he returned to Penn for his sophomore year, where he improved scholastically. In the fall of 1911, he was joined at Penn by a familiar face: his brother, George, where the two lived together at 3628 Samson St right near campus. In 1913, Hyland completed his studies and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree on June 18, 1913. With his brother leaving, George decided to leave Penn and transferred to Brown University, where he completed his degree in 1915.

While no athletic talents were displayed in high school or college, Hyland was a premier athlete. Post-Penn, he spent a year in Philadelphia, where he earned a spot on the newly-formed Broad Street Station Baseball Club. The team was known as the Waiters as that was the occupation of its players at one of the largest and busiest train stations in the country, the Broad Street Station. It's safe to assume that the Hayes brothers were employed there as the station was less than two miles from Penn's campus. A review of the team in the June 21, 1913 edition of the Philadelphia Tribune notes that:

"When one mentions Hyland Hayes at shortstop, they speak of the very best ballplayer in the city, bar none. He can do everything and all equally well – hit, run bases, field, and anything else that is expected of a player."

Hyland's brother, George, also played on the team as catcher. The team played a loose schedule of games against other minor league African American teams in the region, including the Camden Giants, Ardmore Tigers, Philadelphia Colored Doctors, and Lawnside Athletic Club.

In the fall of 1914, Hyland returned to D.C. as he was admitted into Howard University's medical school. He briefly played club baseball in D.C., joining the independent team, the Teddy Bears, the District's club champions. The range of his athletic talents expanded as he earned not only a spot on Howard's varsity basketball team but became their starting guard.

It was his entry to Howard where Hyland was introduced to the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. Of the 27 students in the Freshman Medical School Class, five were members of the Fraternity, with four being initiated in the spring of 1912. Another five Brothers were upperclassmen in Howard's Medical School, including Founder Oscar James Cooper and Charter member Charles Young Harris who were both sophomores. A familiar face was teaching at Howard: Hyland's former commanding officer in his HS Cadet Corp, Founder Frank Coleman, who was hired in the fall of 1914 to teach physics and chemistry at the Howard Academy, the college-prep High school of Howard University. Finally, two

of Hyland's basketball teammates, Irving Taliaferro Nutt and John King Rector (both Alpha Chapter 1914), were Omega men. The genesis of friendship began through these associations with Brothers. Through those relationships, Hyland was asked, accepted, and initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity through Alpha Chapter sometime during the 1914-15 academic year (note: in the early years of the Fraternity, it was commonplace for students in professional schools to be considered and initiated as members. Of the 34 Brothers initiated in 1911-12, seven were in law or medical school at Howard).





Hyland's intersection with Brothers extended beyond Howard. On Monday evening, February 22, 1915, Howard met rival Lincoln University on the hardwood court at the historic Manhattan Casino in Harlem. Lining up against Hyland were the famed three-sport athletes from Lincoln, the Young Brothers, Ulysses "Lyss" Simpson Young, Jr., and his younger brother William "Pimp" Pennington Young as well as Walter Guthrie Anderson. What made this match up unique was Hyland, Nutt, Rector, the Young Brothers, and Anderson were Omega Men. The three Lincoln players were initiated through Beta Chapter in 1914, with Ulysses being initiated in April 1914, shortly after Beta was established. William was initiated in November 1914, just a few months before this historic match-up, and Walter initiated sometime during 1914. In a hard-fought contest, Howard was victorious, 17-11.

According to his classmates, Hyland's first year of med school was "very credible," and he was well-liked in a class memoir about Hyland, they note that "He had a keen sense of comradeship, a winning personality, and kindly smile under almost every circumstance." Right before final exams, on Tuesday, May 11, 1915, the Brothers of Alpha Chapter held a banquet at the St. Charles Café in honor of its new members initiated during the academic year. Hyland participated in this event, enjoying brotherly fellowship while listening to various members speak, including Founders Coleman and Love. Future 6th Grand Basileus Clarence Fitzhugh Holmes, Jr. (Alpha Chapter 1914) memorialized the event by having Brothers sign his program booklet in which Hyland enthusiastically autographed.

His second year of med school was filled with optimism and promise. During the fall semester of 1915, he won one of two prizes in pharmacology. He was also selected as captain of the Howard basketball team. His brother George, graduating from Brown University in 1915, joined Hyland at Howard by following in his father's footsteps and enrolling that fall in Howard's law school. But during the fall semester, Hyland began having health challenges, which, by the end of the semester, advanced to the point where he couldn't play basketball. He completed the fall semester, but after a few weeks into the spring semester, Hyland's health deteriorated to the point where he needed to take a leave of absence from school in February 1916. He was diagnosed with what was then called consumption. Today, we call it tuberculosis. *Continued on next page*

The Memoir of Bro. James Hyland Hayes, Jr.



Hyland retreated to his parents' home in Richmond to convalesce where, after about a month, he succumbed to this disease on Monday, March 13, 1916, at 10:45 AM. He was 23 years young. His classmates were stunned as, in a memoir written by his class for the Howard University Journal, they note that:

"He had been ailing for a little while, but no one ever thought the end was so near.

Youth, ambition, hope – all that a life which beamed with promise ever offered – were plucked as a rosebud, with its pedals yet unfolded."

Brothers struggled with the loss of their friend, Hyland. In the short 4+ year history of the Fraternity, no member had been "summoned by the Silent Messenger." This tragedy marked the chartering of a new chapter for the young Fraternity: Omega Chapter, with Bro. James Hyland Hayes, Jr. becoming its first member. In the March 17, 1916 issue of The Howard University Journal, the Brothers of Alpha Chapter issued a formal resolution on the passing of Bro. James Hyland Hayes, Jr.

James Sr. and Julia held the home-going service for Hyland on Thursday, March 16, 1916, at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Richmond, where friends, classmates, and Fraternity Brothers traveled to honor him. Hyland's final resting place is at Fredericks Hall Cemetery in Louisa County, VA.

Hyland Hays Passes Away

In the death of Mr. Hyland Hays the Medical School and Howard University sustain a great loss. Mr. Hays was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, and at the time of his death was a member of the Sophomore Class of the Howard Medical School.

The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity of which he was a member sends the following resolution:

WHEREAS: It has pleased the Almighty and Omnipotent Father to remove from this terrestrial ball our dear and beloved brother, Hyland Hays, and

WHEREAS: The said brother had so firmly ingratiated himself in

the hearts of his fraternal brothers:

Be it sincerely resolved, that we herein express our deep sympathies to the bereaved family and beseech Almighty God to sustain them in their deep sorrow and bereavement; we ourselves sorrowfully bemoan the death of our dear brother and devoted friend.—

BE it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family of our departed brother, one be placed in the archives of this fraternity and one be sent to the University Journal for publication.

Done this the thirteenth day of March, 1916.

M. B. McAden, Basileus,

J. W. Granady, Keeper of Records.

There is no doubt that Hyland was destined for great things before being called to glory. One only needs to look at his brother, George, and the accomplishments he achieved. Like his father, he became a staunch advocate for civil rights taking on the fight to end segregation. Among his achievements, he partnered with James Nabrit (Eta 1919) and served as lead counsel in the case of Bolling v. Sharpe, one of the four companion cases to the landmark civil rights case Brown v. Board of Education in 1954 (note: George was a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity being initiated through its D.C. alumni Chapter in 1927. He was Polemarch of that Chapter from 1927-33, Sr. Grand Vice Polemarch for their Fraternity in 1930, and received their coveted Laurel Wreath award in 1950). Sadly, death would revisit the Hayes family.

Less than three weeks after testifying before the Senate Committee on Military Affairs, James Sr. passed away on January 28, 1917, ten months after his eldest son, Hyland. He was 58 years old. George Eliot said, "our dead are never dead to us until we have forgotten them." Let us remember, and never forget, the short but well-lived life of Bro. James Hyland Hayes, Jr.

WHAT NOW AMERICA?

s I put fingers to keypad, the quadrennial circus that Americans call "A Presidential Election Year" has mercifully come to a close, White House shenanigans notwithstanding. Given the incumbent Republican candidate and the fact that 2020 has been a year like no other in most of our lifetimes, using the term "circus" to describe this Presidential Election is less a metaphor than an actuality. In the minds of at least 79 million Americans, the votes have been rightfully counted, the dust has settled and a starkly divided nation has to pick up the pieces and move forward. As for the 72 million or so Americans who reside in the political version of "Fantasy Island," "bless their hearts" as my late godmother used to say about folks who were seemed to miss the mark intellectually. We will get back to this sizable demographic in a bit.

Despite the early cattle-call of Democratic primary candidates, the looming and intransigent specter of COVID-19, social upheaval not seen since 1968 and a race-baiting, schoolyard bully as the incumbent, America did well for itself. President-elect Joseph R. Biden is as exciting as a Hallmark Christmas special. However, he is a man shaped by Job-like levels of personal tragedy who brings the requisite amount of experience, gravitas and empathy to the White House when this country needs it most. And of course we have Howard University's own Vice President-elect Kamala D. Harris breaking a multitude of barriers as the first woman, the first Black woman, the first Asian woman, the first graduate of an Historically Black College or University and the first member of the "Divine Nine" to rise to the second highest office in the nation. This achievement makes all of the madness and mayhem leading up to November 3rd worth it. Ms. Harris' ascension to the Vice Presidency, as did Barack Obama's election as President 12 years ago, represents the best of America. A young Black man growing up with a single mother can say "yes I can" and a young Black woman who is a child of divorce can say "yes, I can as well."

However, America being what America is, we will not be allowed to celebrate for long. President Obama's election in 2008 signaled to some that the country had entered some "post-racial" Garden of Eden and that we could all take a deep sigh of relief that we had finally overcome as the old hymn promised. Rather than that historic election serving as the culmination of Dr. King's "I Have A Dream" speech, it became the re-manifestation of our 400-year nightmare as America's foster children. The mere presence of Barack Hussein Obama, II, was the first tug at the Band-Aid that covered America's scabrous history with race since the aftermath of Dr. King's death. A Black man sitting in the Oval Office seem to drive many White folks to the brink of insanity. The "birther" attacks, the Muslim conspiracy theories, the unflattering caricatures of Mrs. Obama and the Obama daughters, and other racially motivated indignities took us back to the days when Black people, when we weren't being abused, existed for the twisted amusement of White people. The fact that Mr. Obama conducted himself as a dignified, intellectual statesman, led the country with cool competence and represented America well on the world stage finally pulled the door of White sanity from its rusty hinges. This break from rational thought was so severe that America saw fit to elect the originator of the aforementioned "birther" theory as President Obama's successor.

This space is not large enough and there is no need to rehash the dizzying insanity, incompetence, rank corruption and hate-sowing of the last four years. But, in a perverse way, we owe President Obama's successor (please be advised that I have yet to use the words "President" and "Trump" as a couplet; this would be as profane as enlisting Samuel L. Jackson to narrate the Sunday School Christmas pageant) a debt of gratitude. His ascension to what is now the Whitest of Houses, enabled America to come face-to-face with the fact that the needle has not moved much since the Civil Rights era two generations ago. Mr. Trump's clarion call to white supremacists and bigots of all stripes, coupled with the epidemic of state-sanctioned murders of Black citizens, have led us to have the "uncomfortable conversation about race in this country" as former U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder admonished us to have a decade ago. My Dad, who was born in Birmingham, Alabama in 1937 and moved to New York City in the late 50's, always tells me that he prefers the in-your-face racism that he experienced as a boy and young man in the Deep South, to the more insidious, subtle, faux-liberal racism that exists in the arguably more evolved Northern States. The hatred and vitriol that has emanated from the mouths of our fellow citizens has been chilling.

If I close my eyes, I would think that I was living in the days of the true "Great Emancipator, Frederick Douglass. A proper reading of American history teaches us that White America has never really recovered from the following developments: 1) emancipating Black people from slavery; 2) the efforts at Reconstruction; 3) passing anti-lynching and anti-Jim Crow laws; 4) our victory in Brown v. Board of Education; 5) passing the Voting Rights Act; and 6) passing the Civil Rights Act. This list is not exhaustive, but what it tells us is that actions can be legislated but emotions and morality cannot.

On the cusp of 2021 and at the dawn of normalcy in the highest office in the land, here we are. In many ways, we are on a hamster wheel of race relations. We expend a tremendous amount of energy to end up in the same place. The Donald did not invent racism but his very presence behind the Resolute Desk allowed the Night Riders of a century ago to walk and talk freely in the bright sunlight of today. And, the fact that approximately 72 million neighbors and colleagues firmly believe that this amalgamation of Lester Maddox, George Wallace and Benito Mussolini is the person who needs to lead this nation is mind-boggling and frightening.

Yet, I remain hopeful when dark cynicism seems to be the only appropriate mood for these times. As a people, we know the obstacles that we have faced since arriving on these stolen shores in shackles. If there is any good that has come out of the murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery and others is that much of

America is energized and enlightened to our plight. (As a footnote, it is really cool to be Black right now, so we need to ride this wave before folks go back to saving baby seals.) Watching Derek Chauvin calmly squeeze the life out of Mr. Floyd's body as if he were extinguishing a cigarette struck a nerve in this country that resonated with so many others outside of the Black community. White people were finally awakened to the reality has been plain to us for centuries. This awakening has forced us have those "hard conversations" that Mr. Holder wants us to have. We still have to contend with the 72 million voters who want to make and keep America great in their blinded and hate-filled eyes. We have been down this road before. Some might say that we have stayed on the same road, but here we are. For those of us from a certain era, we learned a phrase that said, "the difficult we do immediately, the impossible takes a little longer." We have accomplished what many thought impossible with the election of President Obama

and Vice President-elect Harris. Now it is time to focus on the difficult work of ensuring that the next generations of Black people can live and thrive in an America that will allow them to live and thrive.

A RESPONSE TO A FAILED INSURRECTION

Now that the insurrection, spawned by a big election lie, has failed and arrests have commenced, federal and local authorities should not stop until every single individual involved in this seditious act is held accountable. This includes the president and his sycophants like senators Josh Hawley and Ted Cruz. Federal law enforcement officials who were complicit in this undertaking should also be added to the list.

Imagine if you will, hundreds if not thousands of black men and women, but mostly men, from various walks of life. Including, the military and law enforcement - marching on the Capitol. Boldly confronting and subsequently overcoming the meek resistance of a woefully unprepared police force. After breaching the security, they begin smashing windows and breaking doors.

Imagine this armed black mob, some clad in dark clothing. Others in tactical gear holding flex cuffs. A few adorned in animal skins. All roaming menacingly through the Capitol's sacred halls in search of political enemies - politicians who in their minds have betrayed them and must be punished for doing so.

Imagine Members of Congress hundreds of them, taking cover in an undisclosed bunker while staff members and other potential hostages hide behind barricaded doors and under tables. Some calling loved ones to say goodbye - believing their final moments on earth were quickly approaching.

Imagine in the end this "black" insurrection fails. And when the dust settles and some sense of normalcy gradually returns we find the floors and offices of the nation's citadel of democracy littered with broken glass. Important documents scattered everywhere. Personal items and government property missing and sadly five people are declared dead including a Capitol police officer.

Given this scenario does anyone think for one moment that the word "peaceful" would be used to describe this event? How many in the dominant culture would declare support for this act of treason?

For years federal authorities, most notably the FBI as well as non-governmental entities that track hate groups, have warned us about the very real threat of white domestic terrorist groups. And for years the call for real action to be taken against these groups and individuals has fallen on deaf ears.

In light of the events of January 6, 2021 we as a society must make it a priority to root out such groups and the individuals associated with them in every state, city and small town. Now is the time for every citizen who has a healthy respect for the constitution and the rule of law to assist law enforcement in identifying those who engage in seditious activity. To remain silent is to aid and abet a potential act of sedition.

Our lawmakers at every level must provide law enforcement with the necessary legal framework to eradicate organizations that promote sedition. A focal point should be the electronic apparatuses (i.e. websites, social media platforms) that aid these groups in pursuit of their subversive agenda. In short, the same ferocity employed to fight America's "war on drugs" must be applied by law enforcement officials, including prosecutors and judges to fight the war on white domestic terrorism.

For their part - law enforcement must vigorously purge its ranks of those who hold fascist, racist and seditionist sympathies. To be sure, several witnesses say some rioters at the Capitol displayed badges and represented themselves as off duty police officers. These individuals represent a clear and present danger to the republic.

Other governmental institutions (i.e. educational, health, legal) as well as private ones must purge their ranks of those who display fascist, racist or seditious sympathies. Their very presence should not be tolerated.


Omega's history is rich. Her early sons have advanced mankind. Their works have carried on, up to this present time.



His ministry was characterized by Evangelism, Christian Education, Prayer, Stewardship, and Community Service. He served as Director of Youth, Director of Young Adult, and Director of Evangelism for the Carolina Region for 14 years. Bishop Best chaired the Joint Board of Finance for the Oklahoma Region and served as Treasurer for the Southeast Texas Region. Bishop Best conducted many worships throughout the CME Church on stewardship, evangelism, and officers training.

Honors bestowed upon Bishop Best include Winston-Salem Human Relations Commission, Humanitarian Award (2000), and Phillip School of Theology (ITC) Distinguished Award for Ministry (2004). Bishop Best also served as a reading tutor for 3rd graders at Kimberly Park Elementary School.

In Oklahoma, Bishop Best was a member of Oklahoma Conference of Churches and he tutored and mentored 3rd through 5th graders in math and reading at the Martin Luther King Elementary School in Oklahoma City, OK as part of his church's ministry One Church One School.

In Houston, Bishop Best was a member of Harris County Council of Organizations and the NAACP. He served on the Board of Trustees at Texas College. He was honored for outstanding community service by Congressman Al Green at a social justice rally held at Metropolitan CME in 2013.

Bishop Best was a lifetime member of Omega Phi Psi Fraternity and a member of the Tau Tau Chapter in Los Angeles, CA. Bishop Best was elected the 61st Bishop of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church on the first ballot on July 1, 2014, in Baltimore, Maryland. 
Brother Floyd Breeland



Rocket Scientist




